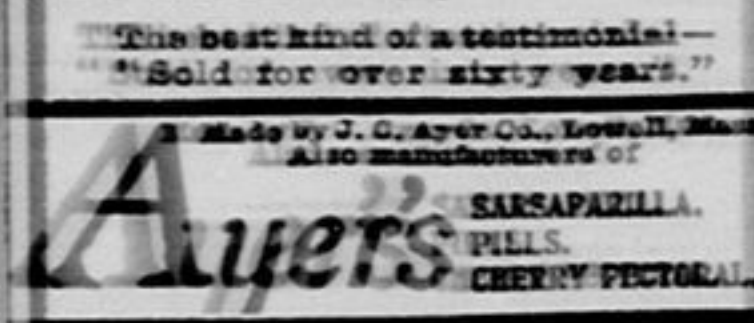

Does any one know the whereabouts of M. Clark Scott whose recent address was Okotoks, Sask., according to our mailing list?

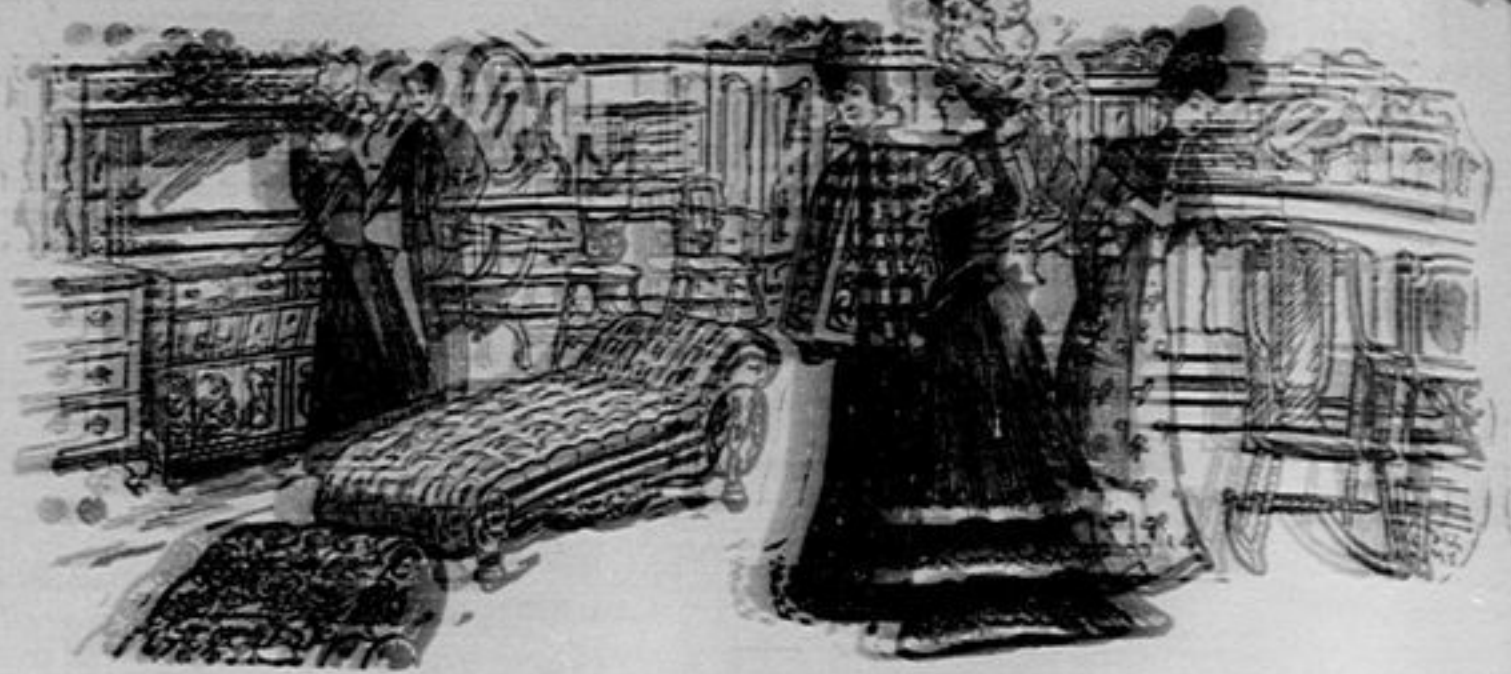
