SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The annual S. S. Convention of the
 Deaneary of Grey was held in Christ
 Church, Markdale, on Thursday, July
 19th, and was one of the most success-
 ful conventions ever held in Markdale.
 Delegates were present from Owen
 Sound, Chatsworth, Desboro, Holland
 Centre, Berkeley, Shelburne and Dun-
 dalk. The Celebration of Holy Com-
 munion was held at 10 a. m. Rev.
 Mr. Ardill, of Owen Sound, preached
 a very impressive sermon, taking for
 his text Luke, 5: 4, "Launch out
 into the deep."

The afternoon session commenced
 at 2 p. m. In the absence of Mr. Ab-
 bott, of Meaford, Rec.-Sec. Rev. Mr.
 Reilly, of Chatsworth, was appointed
 Secretary for the convention. The
 first paper read was on "Primary
 Work" written by Miss Ashton, of
 Owen Sound, and read by Miss Beck-
 ett. This paper showed clearly that
 the writer had a complete understand-
 ing of her subject which could only
 be gained by experience. She said
 truly that the time had come when it
 is necessary to spend time, thought,
 and money to hold children in the
 Sunday School. Miss Ashton advised
 Sunday Schools to adopt the Cradle
 Roll method, thereby bringing the
 children into the Sunday School in
 infancy. The paper read by Mr. J.
 W. Ford, Jr. dealt with the teaching
 of Church Doctrine and Church History
 in the Sunday School. Mr. Ford
 believes that the knowledge of Church
 Doctrine and Church History is es-
 sential to the upholding and strength-
 ening of the church, and that the
 foundation of this knowledge should
 be laid in the Sunday School. A very
 interesting paper was read by Miss
 Hanbury, a teacher in the Owen
 Sound Sunday School, on how to re-
 tain the senior boys in the School.
 Miss Hanbury handled her subject
 very cleverly, and the fact that Miss
 Hanbury has been able to retain the
 senior boy in her class is the greatest
 recommendation that could be given
 for the adoption of her methods.

Miss Winona Haskett, of Markdale,
 read a very interesting paper on
 "The Home." Miss Haskett dealt
 with the early Jewish home life, the
 modern home life and the ideal life.
 The ideal home life should be based
 on perfect understandings. The
 best legacy a man can leave his fam-
 ily is a happy home. It is for the
 home to be the embodiment of love;
 for that it is necessary to have co-
 operation, and there can be no perfect
 co-operation where there is not per-
 fect understanding. Miss Martha
 Elliott read a very cleverly written
 paper, dealing with the frailties and
 short comings of that patient and
 long suffering creature, the Sunday
 School Teacher. Miss Elliott touch-
 ed on many points in the teachers,
 teaching, surroundings and home life,
 that are a drawback to the ideal Sun-
 day School, and showed how these
 evils might be remedied by the teach-
 ers and their influence. Many valu-
 able suggestions were brought out
 during the discussions of the differ-
 ent papers.

It was decided to hold the next
 convention in Shelburne, and the fol-
 lowing officers were appointed:
 President, the rector of Shelburne;
 Vice Pres., Miss Agar, Owen Sound;
 Rec.-Sec., Miss Sanford, Shelburne;
 Cor.-Sec'y, Miss Berwick, Shelburne;
 Reporting Sec., Miss Kells, Markdale.
 A vote of thanks was tendered the
 Rector and congregation of Christ
 Church for their hospitality and the
 efforts made to assure the success of
 the convention.

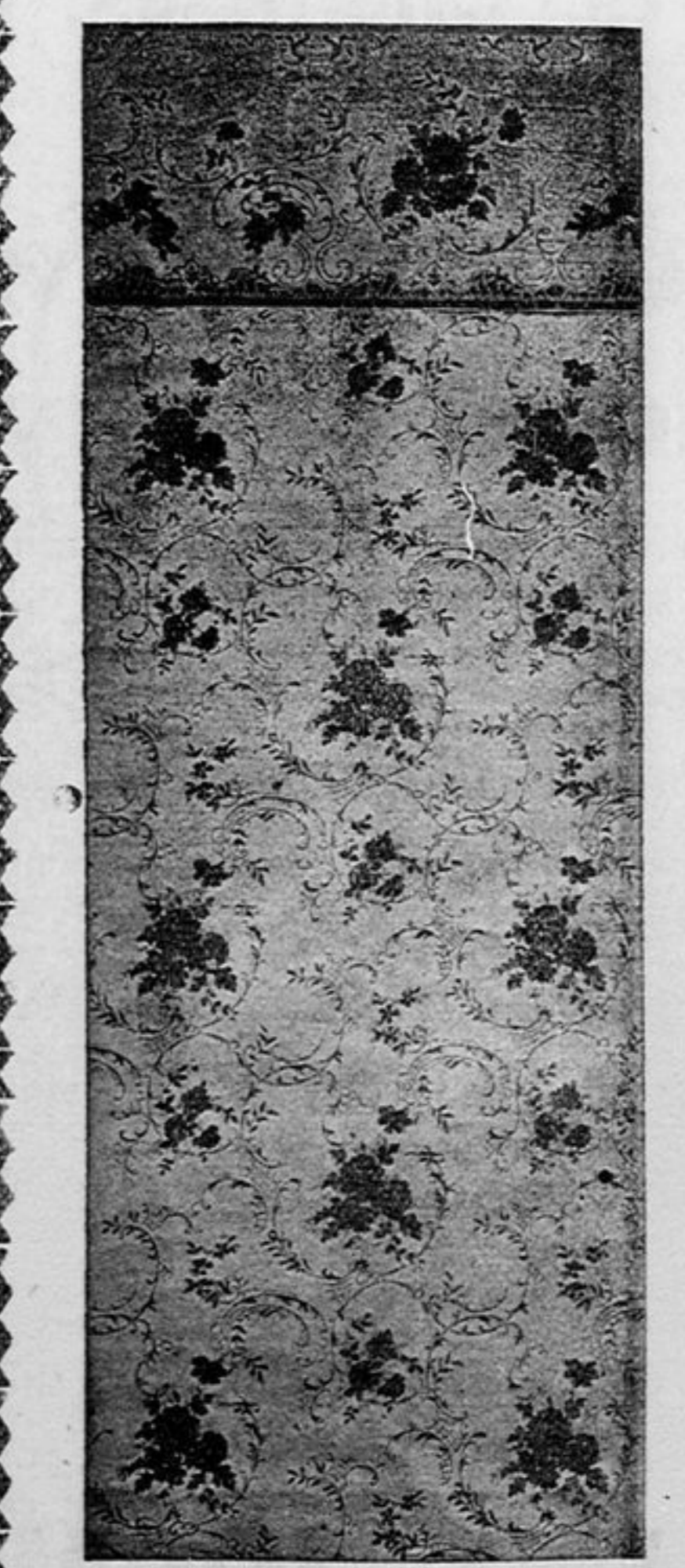
