The Grand Trunk last Wednesday closed a deal by which acquire a block of property to the north-west of the station at Goderich for the purpose of erecting a new freight office and large freight shed. Mr. Robt. Bennett, G. T. R. brakeman, and formerly in the similar employ of the C. P. R. here up to two weeks ago, was injured at Eden Grove, near Paisley, last week, when a train of empty cattle cars jumped the track in some mysterious manner. The locomotive was going "tender first," and together with several cars, was a complete wreck. Mr. Bennett, of this town, had his arm and leg painfully injured, although no bones were fractured. Engineer Edmunds and Conductor Mack were slightly injured, and the fireman was seriously injured, although it is thought he will recover. The track was blocked for a short time and passengers were transferred at the wreck.—O S Sun

Miss Nellie Shunk, of Toronto, a former resident of Meaford, answered a matrimonial advertisement which appeared in a Toledo, Ohio, matrimonial paper. Her prospective husband was a convict, serving 18 months in the Columbus penitentiary for embezzlement, his term expiring about the middle of August, and but for the prompt interference of the penitentiary officials the couple would have been married about the first of September. The officials wrote to Nellie a few days before telling her of the circumstances and the whole affair was broken off. Miss Shunk replying to the officials that she would not think of marrying a convict. Firestone, the prospective-groom, had been twice married before, his first wife being dead and his second having obtained a divorce during his imprisonment.—News.

While breaking up a piece of swamp land the other day, Mr. W. Heidmiller unearthed a curiosity in the way of an instrument that was evidently fashioned by an Indian. The material seems to be slate, being lighter than stone, and of a bluish or black color. It is shaped like an axe except instead of being thin at one end, it has a pretty good edge at both ends. In the centre are two small holes, probably for the purpose of running a string through to tie on a handle. There can be no doubt that this axe-shaped instrument was used for one of two purposes, a skinning knife or a tomahawk. A very serious and painful accident occurred on Saturday afternoon on the farm of Mr. J. Fisher, 6 1/2 miles north of Durham. Mr. Fisher was working in the barn, helping to outload loose hay with a hay fork. He was standing in the south mow holding the trip ropes in his hand while the grain was being dumped into the north mow. A loose coil of rope was lying at Mr. Fisher's feet, which, in some way, got fastened about one of

them. In dumping the load the horses went too far and Mr. Fisher was drawn up to a considerable height, head downward, and carried across to the north mow where he struck a beam with such force that his right hip was dislocated and badly lacerated, in fact the right leg was almost severed from the body. Mr. Fisher is improving and will soon be none the worse for the accident.—Collingwood Bulletin.
