

### A SUCCESSFUL EVENT

Fine Weather and a Large Crowd Favors Holstein's Fall Fair.

The Egremont Agricultural Society held their exhibition in Holstein Tuesday. It was ideal weather, and from early morning conveyances could be seen coming from all directions loaded with the best products of the township. By ten o'clock the hall was pretty well filled. The flower stands in the centre of the lower hall were filled with all kinds of flowering and foliage plants, cacti and cut flowers. The fruit display was excellent, and dispels the idea to a casual observer that the year is not a good one for fruit. Egremont is certainly blessed in this connection if we are to take the Holstein Fair as an indication of this year's orchard product. Everything on exhibition seemed large of its kind. There were big cabbages, big mangolds, big turnips, big pumpkins, big squash, and such citrus as we never saw before. A lot of them were as big as ordinary pumpkins, and had we not seen them and felt their weight we could scarcely believe the township capable of such productions. Even yet it seems difficult to believe them real citrus.

As usual the ladies have demonstrated their ability in the department of cookery. The bread, pies, cakes and all kinds of pastry were extremely tempting, and the wines were tempting to look upon. The butter and cheese were largely in evidence and appeared to be of No. 1 quality.

The side of the school building was profusely decorated with exhibits from Le Werne's and Chapman's, the two photo artists, of Mt. Forest. Both groups were much admired by the passing crowds, who wished to look on something really esthetic.

There was also a good display of fancy work and domestic manufactures. Quilts in great variety were to be seen in the upper hall, and the fancy work was quite equal to that of former years, if not in excess in quantity and quality.

The floral displays previously referred to were the property of three exhibitors chiefly, one full side of the centre row was owned by Dr. Brown while the other side contained the property of Mrs. Main and Mr. W. J. Adams. The variety and quality were regarded as excellent.

The Secretary, Mr. W. J. Sharp, was indefatigable in his efforts to attend the wants of everybody. He was a busy man, and no doubt his energy and attention to business had much to do with the success of the year's show. He had able assistants in the persons of Messrs. Durrant and Kells.

On the grounds there was quite an exhibit by the Holstein Supply Co. They had a buggy, six cutters, a wagon, turnip pulpers, steel pumps, a couple of wheelbarrows, a Chatham incubator, a Canada steel range and other articles. The same Company had a nice exhibit of upholstered furniture in the upper hall.

A desired improvement is shown in the erection of a commodious shed in which sheep, pigs and stock are all comfortably placed under cover and protected from the heat of a burning sun. Of the sheep exhibit there seemed to be a majority of the Oxford breed. There were also a number of Leicesters of good quality.
