Walter Smith Arrested.  
Walter Smith, the sixteen year old Barnardo Home boy, who, on July 10th last, ran away from his employer, Mr. John W. Irwin, of the Town Line, with about \$50 that did not belong to him and for whose arrest a warrant was issued, is now in Owen Sound jail awaiting trial.  
Mr. C. Knott, the County Constable

here, traced the boy from Meaford to Penetang and thence to Stayner. Arresting him in the township of Nottawasaga, about four miles from Stayner, on Saturday morning last, Mr. Knott brought him before Chas. Pye, Esq., J. P., who, after giving him a preliminary hearing, found evidence of guilt sufficient to commit him to Owen Sound jail to await trial.—Clarksburg Reflector.

**SENIOR TEACHERS' CERTIFICATE**  
There has for many years been a regrettable scarcity of first-class teachers in the public schools of Ont. It is not necessary to speculate as to all the causes that have operated to bring about and maintain his condition of the profession, with one of them we are just now specially concerned—the severity of the strain of preparation for the senior no-professional firsts are permitted to acquire professional certificates of the same grade, and under this limitation the holders of professional firsts have been for a long time a vanishing quantity, which seemed likely to disappear altogether under the abolition of the Latin requirement for the junior examination, while it has been till now maintained for the senior one.

With a view to checking this tendency the Education Department has announced what seems to be a well considered plan for facilitating the acquirement of first-class non-professional standing by second class teachers while they are engaged in the active pursuit of their profession. It is practically impossible for a public school teacher, as salaries are, to give up work for even one year to attend a high school; under the new provision he should be able to prepare for the higher examination through being enabled to take it on four installments instead of two. Moreover, as in the universities, a candidate may carry over a single subject in which he happens to fail, so the senior candidate may, if he makes a creditable pass in all the subjects but one of a group, try that one again when he attempts the next group.

The least commendable feature of the plan is the concession made to junior teachers of date not later than 1900, authorizing them to dispense altogether with Latin at the senior examination provided they take an exceptionally severe course in the English language and literature. If such a substitution is to be allowed at all the substitute English course proposed is a good one for the purpose. It is to be hoped that this relaxation in the case of a comparative few second-class teachers will not lead to a successful effort to have it extended to all senior candidates. Latin is now obligatory on them, and it should remain so, especially in view of the fact that none but first-class teachers will be allowed hereafter to do what is virtually high school work in the continuation classes of the public schools. No one can be a good teacher of English who does not know Latin.—Globe.

**For Abusing A Horse.**  
On Friday Alfred Simmonds, Wm. Mitchell, Wm Sutherland and John McIntosh hired a couple of rigs from Messrs. Winterburn Bros. with the avowed intention of visiting the Owen Sound fair. They changed their plans, however, and went to Chatsworth instead, where they filled up on cheap booze and became very noisy. They indulged in racing contests and subjected the livery horses to pretty rough usage. Word was sent to Owen Sound and a watch set for their return. The drive home apparently did not cool them down for they repeated the horse racing along Hill street, and on their return to the livery barn a couple of hours later than had been agreed upon. Simmonds became very abusive when taken to task for ill treating the horses by Mr. Winterburn, and wanted to threaten everyone in sight. P. C. Foster soon took all the fight out of him by locking him up for the night. His companions were allowed to go on furnishing their names and addresses. In the police court next morning Simmonds was fined \$10 and costs for being drunk and disorderly, and \$1 and costs for abusing the horse, amounting in all to \$17.75. Wm. Mitchell was assessed \$5 and costs. The other two were not so much to blame and were not prosecuted. After settling with the county clerk, Mr. James Dudgeon, the Chatsworth constable, presented the four with an urgent invitation to attend a magistrate's court at Chatsworth on Tuesday when a further fine of \$5 each and costs were added to their little bill of expenses. All told their drive cost them close onto \$50.—Owen Sound Times.
