# GAS MACHINE EXPLOSION.

He went upstairs for something he needed, and just as he entered the gas room on his return an explosion occurred blowing the windows out of the building and wrecking the machine. Harrison was dazed for a minute by the noise and shock and was literally covered with carbide sediment, particles of which were imbedded in his face and neck causing the blood to ooze through the skin. China to the value of \$25 was broken and the gas machine worth \$100 was destroyed. Harrison regards his escape as miraculous, but he doesn't intend to take chances on another miracle. He is done with gas machines and has had electric lights put in instead.—Teeswater News.
