### ICE AND TYPHOID.

Typhoid seems to go hand in hand with Lake water in all the big cities using that source of supply. But Chicago, which has now more cases than it has had since 1893, attributes its epidemic not to the municipal water supply but to impure milk and ice. Owing to the lack of rain, dairymen have taken water from disused wells and stagnant pools, and the icemen, it is claimed, because of the crop shortage, utilized the product from polluted ponds. Citizens are warned to eat no food that has come in direct contact with the ice, and to drink no water in which ice has been placed.
