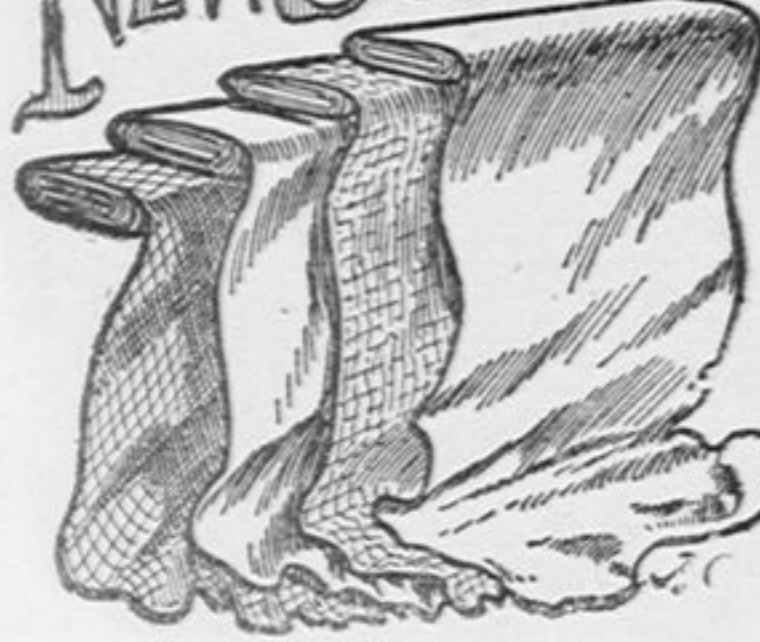

Richardson; "Major Duffey," county clerk, etc., Dr. Murray; "Squire Ripley," a Virginian landlord, Geo. Richardson; "Lige," a gentleman of color, Geo. McTavish. To elaborate, we haven't space, but must say the play was well balanced and interestingly sustained throughout, which was shown by the unabated attention and at times hearty applause of the audience.
