Local Option and Social Vice.

The widely quoted statement of Police Magistrate Hunt of the County of Elgin to the effect that as the result of Local Option respectable licensed hotels had degenerated into resorts for social debauchery; that temperance people have shown a cowardly apathy toward the greater evil and, inferentially at least, recommended a return to license, has been eagerly laid hold of by the liquor interest in its frantic fight against local option. Mr. Hunt has greatly modified his sweeping indictment and has practically narrowed down the charge to one house. This house was notorious as a disreputable resort for years and yet continued to hold a license until it was cut off by the passage of the Local Option by law. So far from being apathetic, in regard to the matter the temperance people not only stood by the law officer, but urged him to take action, even procedure, but to no purpose. An appeal to the License Department in Toronto also proved futile.

Instead of the facts proving the temperance people guilty of cowardly apathy or showing that Local Option leads to moral degeneracy, they rather serve to emphasize the fact that men of low moral calibre may and do obtain licenses in houses that are known to be homes of social vice and that neither the salaried custodians of the law, nor the government which appoints them can be trusted to perform their duty in matters of moral reform unless they feel the pressure of organized public opinion behind them. That all places of public entertainment should be licensed and under strict government inspection scarcely needs any argument, but that the removal of liquor licenses is an incentive to social vice is a position too absurd to be entertained for a moment by any sane man. The liquor interest fears local option for a very different reason than that it is the herald of social immorality. It is an instrument for temperance reform that should be used vigorously and fearlessly. The sweeping away of the rallying centre for all that is lowest and worst in any community. Put the house of public entertainment under rigid inspection, but the licensed bar must go.—The Presbyterian.

RAILWAY RATES.

People attending the Exhibition from points in Ontario outside of Toronto will be able to do so at lowest one-way, first-class fare as follows:

On Wednesday and Thursday, Nov. 7th and 8th, special excursions will be run by the railways to Toronto from all points in Ontario, at lowest one-way, first-class fare. Railway tickets bought on these dates will be good for return up to and including Nov. 10th. People desiring to attend the Exhibition on other dates will be able to do so at the same rate, but it will be necessary for them to obtain Standard Certificates from their station agent when they purchase their tickets to Toronto. One-way tickets to Toronto, with Standard Convention Certificates, can be purchased from Nov. 2nd to 10th inclusive, and will be honored for the return journey free, regardless of the number in attendance, up to and including Nov. 14th, 1906. These Certificates must be endorsed by the Secretary at the Exhibition in Massey Hall before they will be honored by the railways for the return trip. A fee of 25 cents will be charged for each Certificate issued.

ONTARIO HORTICULTURAL EXHIBITION.

A Rival for the Winter Fair.

From the interest being manifested in the approaching Ontario Horticultural Exhibition, which will be held in Toronto, November 6th to 10th, it would appear that this exhibition is rapidly becoming a formidable rival in its way to the Winter Fair at Guelph.

This year the railways for the first time have agreed to run half rate excursions to the exhibition from all parts of the province and to advertise it along their lines. This, it is believed, will greatly increase the attendance. Already it is evident that the exhibits of fruit, flowers and vegetables will far eclipse those made at the two previous exhibitions. In fact it is feared that Massey Hall will not begin to accommodate properly the exhibits that will be made.

A feature of the exhibition this year will be the presence of the Black Dyke Band from Yorkshire, England, which has been secured at an expense of \$2,000, to play each afternoon and evening throughout the exhibition. Four different conventions will be held in conjunction with the exhibition, including the annual convention of the Fruit Growers' Association, the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association, the Ontario Bee Keepers' Association and the Ontario Horticultural Association.

Among the most notable exhibits will be displays that will be made by the Ontario Fruit Experiment Stations, the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa, and the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph. The latter institution is arranging a special nature study exhibit, which will be inspected by the senior pupils of the city schools of Toronto, who have been given a part holiday for this purpose.

The exhibition is to be opened on the evening of Tuesday, November 6th, by Premier Whitney. There is reason to believe that in time this annual exhibition will become as noted in Canada as the Royal Horticultural Exhibition in London, England.
