GENERAL NEWS

A Children's Aid Society has been organized at Niagara Falls, Ont.

Ingersoll police have started out to enforce the anti-spitting-by-law.

There are now 100 cases of small-pox in Westmoreland county, N. B.

Ottawa boarding house keepers have increased their weekly rate by \$1.

An attempt will be made to organize a newsboys' association in Windsor.

The residence of C. A. Case, St. Catharines, was seriously damaged by fire.

Woodstock Public school teachers have petitioned for an increase in salaries.

Work on the enlargement of the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa will begin this week.

It is reported that the municipal elections at Kingston will be run on strict party lines.

While duck hunting on Georgian Bay, Rev. A. J. Fowlie, of Coldwater, was shot in the leg.

Last month's customs collections at Montreal were \$1,325,511, the largest in the history of the port.

Nine horses and two cows were burned with Rosner & Brownstone's stable at Plum Coulee, Man.

The Cataract Power Co. has given the work of erecting it's Hamilton terminal station to the White Co.

R. M. Cramer is under arrest at Montreal for fraud. He posed as the heir of half a million in Germany.

William Fenn, aged 60, a section man, was killed at Orillia by a yard engine. He leaves a wife and family.

Hon. Rodolphe Lamieux was the orator at the Caledonian Society's concert at the Monument National last Wednesday night.

The threshing returns of the Department of the Interior so far received show a crop of 90,824,141 bushels.

Earl Grey has asked the assistance of all the provincial lieutenants governors in selecting competing companies for the musical and theatrical competition to be held at Ottawa during January.

Elections will be held in St. Anne's and St. Mary's divisions, Montreal, on Nov. 14. The Nioelet writ is not yet issued.

Ottawa police are investigating robberies at the stores of Wm. Howe, bicycle dealer, and Edouard Gaulin, jeweller.

John Lacey, a C. N. R. employe, injured near Swan River, is in a serious state in the General Hospital, Winnipeg.

Western University students, London, refuse to attend lectures because they are at odds with Dr. Moorhouse.

The Loan Exhibition of the Women's Historical Society in the National Gallery, Ottawa, was opened by Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Sister Mary St. Felix, of St. Joseph's, died at St. Joseph's Hospital, Hamilton, after an illness of five weeks from typhoid fever.

Matthew Smith, of Hampton, has been appointed to succeed Hon. Geo. Simpson as member of the Prince Edward Provincial Executive.

During the year ending Sept. 30th there were 236 summary convictions and 37 indictable offences disposed of in the Windsor Police Court.

Bert Andrews has been arrested at Port Huron, Michigan, on a charge of setting fire to a house and barn seven years ago at Port Dover.

The Northern Counties Investment Co. is suing the C. P. R. at Vancouver for \$23,000 damages for the destruction of a 60 acre orchard by fire.

Relatives of Joseph Renaud, the man who disappeared from Sandwich ten days ago, have given up the search for his body in the Sandwich slip.

The Dominion Government is suing the Ocean Steamship Co. at Vancouver for failure to return two Japanese who are afflicted with trachoma.

The G. T. R. has raised an objection, and consideration of the application of the C. N. R. for an entrance into Ottawa has been deferred by Hon. Mr. Emmerson.

Magistrate O'Loane, of Stratford, has been advised that Samuel P. Chant, an insane immigrant, will be returned to England by the provincial authorities.

The customs receipts as shown at Ottawa, for the last four months, have increased \$2,176,445 over the same period last year. The gain for October is \$670,373.

Fred. Holden was fined \$50 and costs at Indian Head, Sask., under the Grain Act. He was not an applicant under the act, but obtained cars and then transferred them to friends.

An Innerkip man, while in a Woodstock hotel put a lighted pipe in a pocket which contained \$50 in bills, but the fire was put out before the man was injured. The money was destroyed.

Baron Von Hagen, a German sportsman, stayed one month in the Cassiar country in British Columbia on a hunting trip, and came back with two moose, three caribou, three mountain sheep, a black bear and a silver fox.

Geo. Holmes, an Amherstburg hotelkeeper, has appealed from a conviction registered against him by Magistrate Beeman at Essex. Holmes claims that the case should have been tried before Magistrate McGee at Amherstburg.
