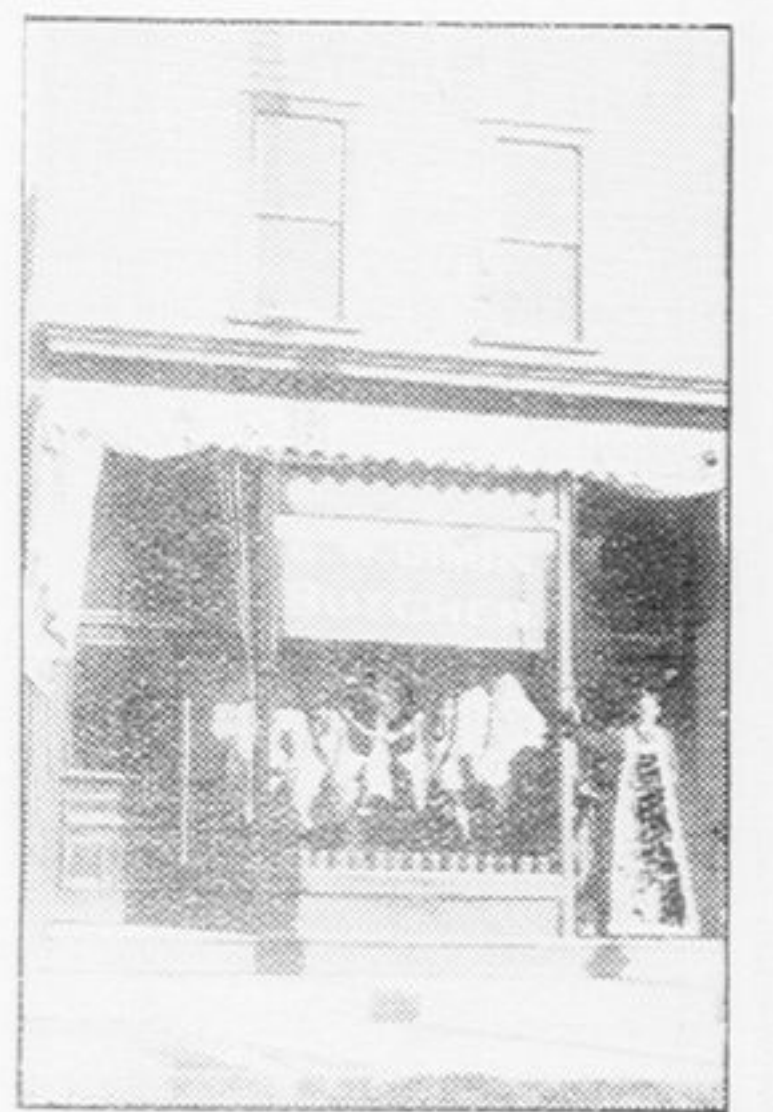
MR. JAMES SMITH

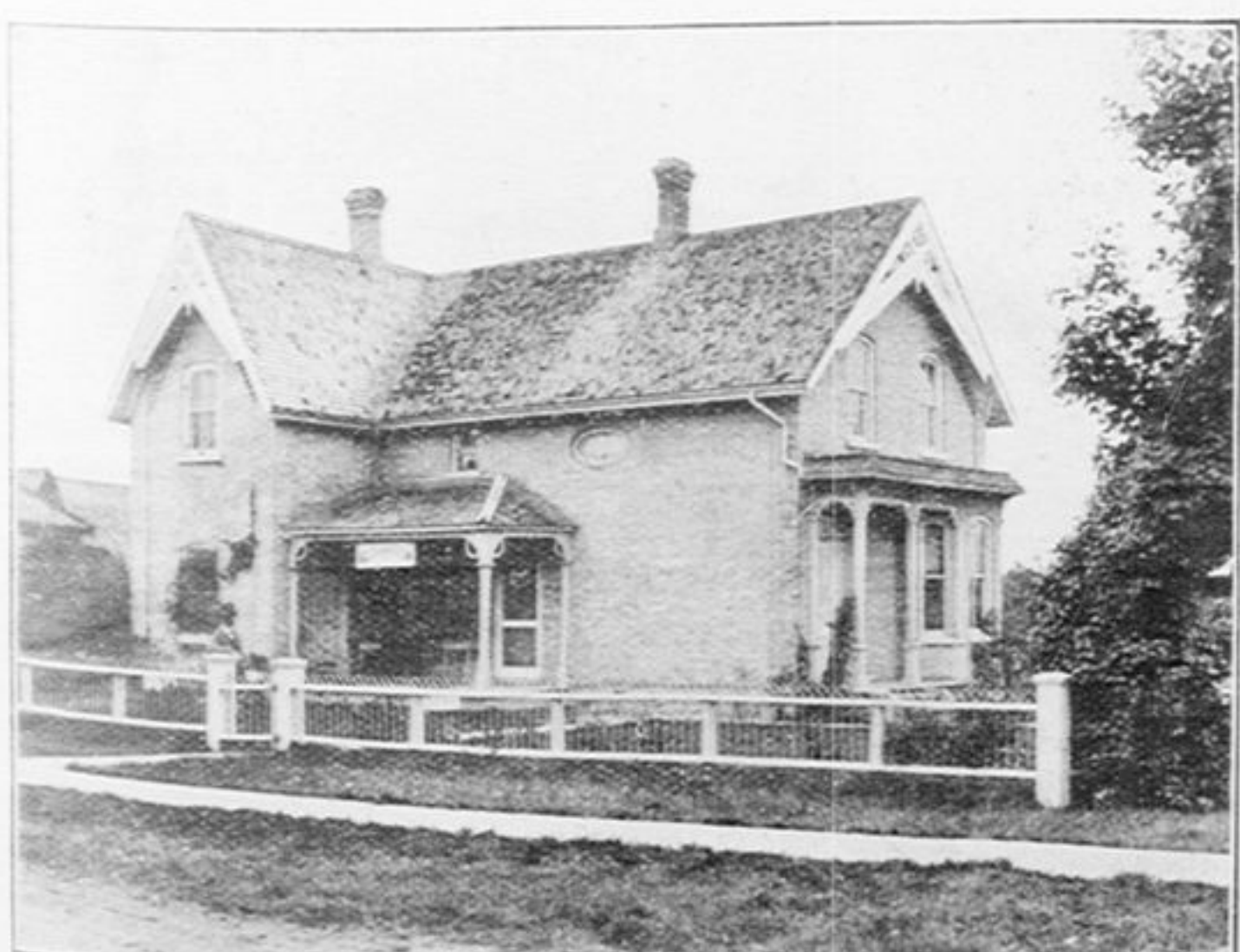

We boast of our educational system, but good as it may be in theory, it needs the guidance of a practical educationist to yield a full fruition.

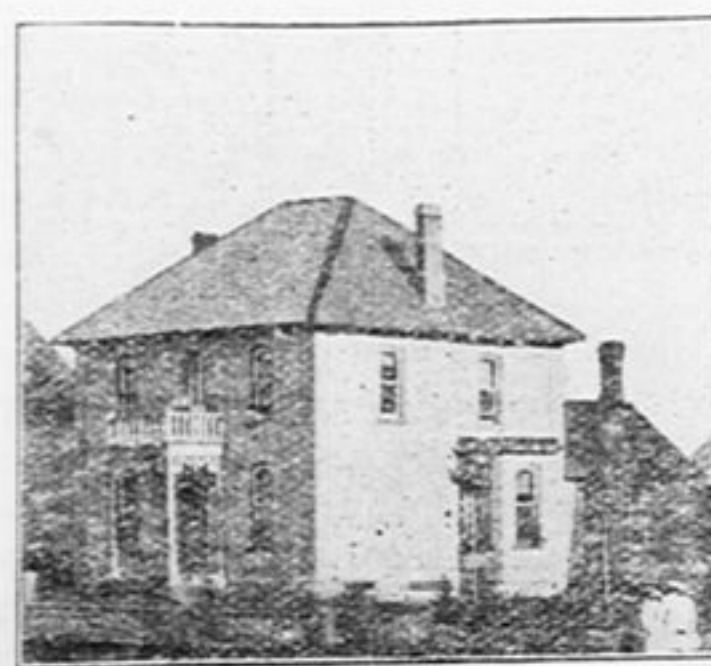

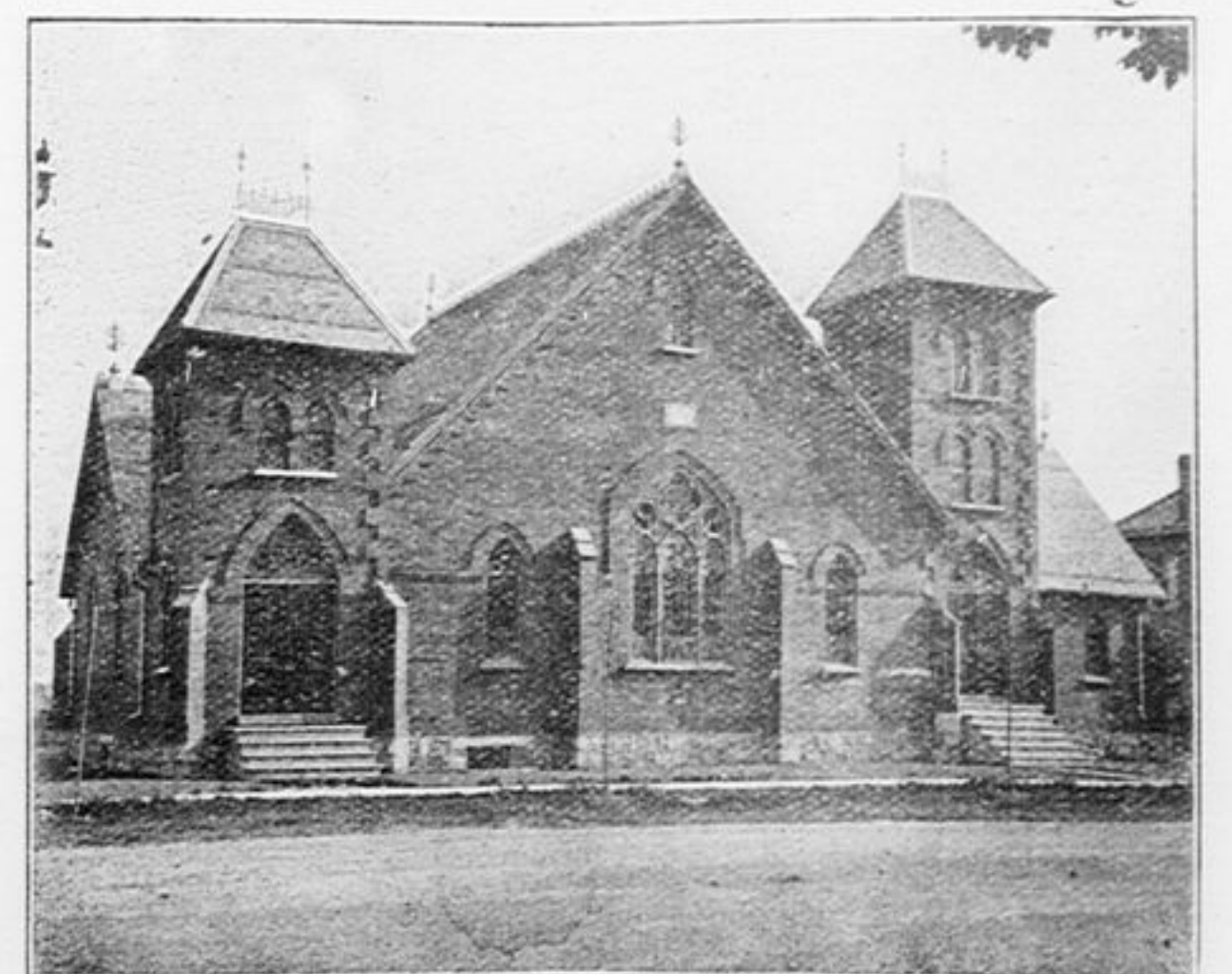
