TAUGHT SCHOOL FIFTY YEARS.

After fifty years' service in the teaching profession, forty-eight years in Toronto, Mr. McAllister will resign at the end of the present year. When he started in Toronto in 1858 Ladies there were only five schools in the city. We are not told how many there are now, but there must be over six hundred teachers. Great changes have taken place during the last fifty years, and it must be a delight to Mr. McAllister to look over the great material advancement of the city, as well as to rejoice over the now prominent men, who once passed through his hands as pupils Teaching has never been a very re munerative profession, but the man who spends a half a century in the work in one city must have a wealth of satisfaction in knowing that he was instrumental in moulding the lives and characters of some who are now prominent members of society. A number of Toronto teachers were his pupils at one time. He says :-

"The present Mrs. J. D. Nasmith was then one of our most brilliant pupils and won several scholorships Other pupils were the present City Treasurer, Mr. Coady, Messrs George and James Murray, Mr Gourlay. heat of the firm of Messrs Gourlay, Winter & Leeming, and Mr. Simpson a lawyer now deceased

"Until 1864 I taught there, then I was appointed to the principalship of the Gavins street school. This was then a little wooden two roomed school, surrounded by commens. Among my pupils here were Judge Winchester and Harry Gilmour, of Chicago, ex-champion light-weight boxer of the world.

"In 1866 I was transferred to the principalship of the John street school. Here, among my pupils were John Alexander, of the firm of Alexander & Cable; W. Fox, of the firm Rev. Dr. Caldwell, Flesherton will of Fox & Ross and Mr. George Heintz-

IMPROVEMENTS IN LATER YEARS

Mr. McAllister states there has been a decided improvement in educational conditions of later years. The teacher's life to day is better than it used to be, and his work is more appreciated than formerly. There is also an improvement in the policeness and bearing of the city

Mr. McAllister has been an active member of the Ontario Educational Association since its inception in 1861. In 1885 he was its president. In the early days of the Association, he pointed out, it had great difficulty in being recognized at all by the educational authorities, but, notwithstanding, many of the recommendations made, even in the early days, were incorporated in the Education Acts of subsequent periods. Mr. McAllister pays tribute to the editorial pen of the late Wm. Houston for having contributed towards having the Association recognized as a power in
