The rule for mixing the precipitating purifier which you are about to use is 1 to 6,000. It is more than likely that you will have no way to ascertain

these exact proportions, but do not let that discourage you. A little experience is worth a good deal in this world, whether the work be done is compliusing the separator will serve to guide you all right. For a starter, say that to a pitcher

holding a quart of water you take a small amount of pulverized alum, about what would go on the rounded point of the blade of a pocketknife, toss it into the water and mix it thoroughly.
