Dairy Instruction and Sanitary Inspection of Factories and Creameries.

The Dairy Instruction of the past few years has resulted in a marked improvement in the general equipment and sanitary conditions of factories. Many proprietors and makers have, however, stated to the instructors and members of the Dairymen's Associations that they were some what discouraged after going to the expense and trouble which were found necessary to make improvements considered essential by the dairy instructors. 
