POULTRY HOUSES.

By W. R. Graham, B. S. A.

The poultry houses I have seen no many of the farms in Ontario are mostly of two kinds-those that are small, poorly lighted, and seldom cleaned; and those that are well built, well ilghted, and frequently kept moderately clean. The last mentioned houses are not much more satisfactory than the first.

The essential points in a poultry house are light, dryness and good ventilation. The house smells of chickens, or in other words, is poorly ventilated, and in many instances the chickens are unhealthy. Sometimes they lay well during winter, but the eggs are very poor for hatching purposes.

For a number of years we have been trying to find some way to overcome these difficulties.
