#### POLICE OF PARIS.

How the Third Brigade Spies Upon the Whole Force.

Vance Thompson describes in Every- The Undertaker body's the famous Third brigade of the Paris police, whose business is to supervise the police. It is composed of an officer de paix, a principal inspector, a brigadier, five subbrigadiers and about seventy-five picked men. About half are assigned to watch the patrolmen. He is a bold policeman who commits any of the little sins dear to the patrolman's heart. There is hardly a chance that he will not be detected in time. Reprimand follows, after that fine and lastly dismissal. There is always a long "waiting list" of candidates, sound young fellows fresh from the army, and the city can choose

its new servants among the best. The other half of the Third brigade is engaged in work of a more typically Latin kind. It investigates all complaints made against the patrolmen by chiefs and citizens, and it maintains a regular system of espionage upon the private lives of all policemen.

"This, of course, is the Latin way of doing things," writes Mr. Thompson. "Wrong as it may be in principle, it serves to weed out the men of bad character and bad habits and bad associations, and it prevents that monstrous alliance of the police and the lawbreakers."
