Hoenig—Heipel—That the resignation of Andrew Schenk as security for the Township Treasurer be accepted.—Carried.

Weber—Moore—That the security of Donald McKinnon be accepted as security to the Township Treasurer in the place of A. Schenk.—Carried.

Weber—Koenig—That this Council accept the sum of \$26.90 re Fred. Reimer's taxes, lot 15, con. 4, Normanby, and that the Clerk write the County Treasurer and have same erased on his books.—Carried.

The Reeve as Chairman of the Special Committee re Newton case, reported that they waited on Mr. Newton and settled as follows: Newton to get \$1,125, his lawyer \$50, the Council to pay all costs, including doctor's bills and hospital charges. Mr. Richardson was informed by the Children's Aid Society at Owen Sound to take the case in hand and on Friday last she and the Children appeared before Magistrate Reiford and after a thorough investigation, sufficient evidence was given to corroborate the charges. Mr. Richardson secured the kindness of Rev. (Mrs) Miller to accompany the children to the Children's Shelter at Owen Sound while he returned to his home at Flesherton. It is to be hoped that this incident will have a salutary effect, and that others who are none too careful in bringing up their children may see the wisdom of doing so. Mr. J. J. Kelso, superintendent of the Children's Aid Society in tents making frequent visits to town and we trust that he will not again have occasion to exercise his authority.—Hanover Post.
