



ROBBED LETTER BAGS.

William J. Leroy, Formerly of Meaford, Pleads Guilty to Charges of Theft.

All last winter and up to about the 1st of July William J. Leroy, a young man of rather prepossessing appearance and coultly manner, was a brakesman for G. T. R, on the train running between Allandale and Meaford.
