LIKE CLOUDS AND WIND WITHOUT RAIN

The man who devotes most of his time to church affairs to the neglect of his business will just as surely come to grief as he who is found at the ball game or the race track when he should be at his store or his office. Men talk about the misfortune of business and attribute to "mysterious Providence" results that knew no other cause than common laziness or willful neglect. Such rot as these idiots talk! The best clerk in the world will not fill the place of the proprietor of an establishment. We heard the other day of a merchant in a Western city who missed one of his best opportunities of the

season by being so interested in a sporting event that he could not be seen at his office at the proper time. 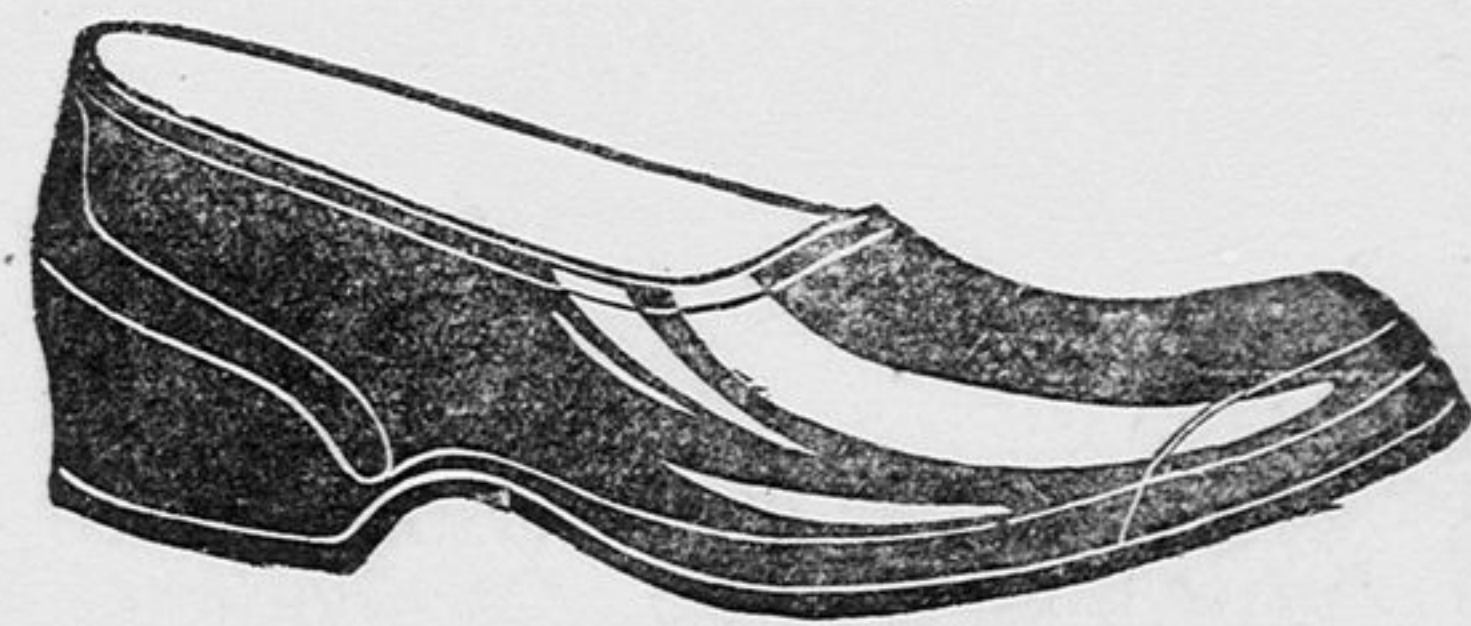
