FROZEN IN THE ICE.

Tom Armstrong had many friends
at Woodford and vicinity, and all
were shocked last week to learn of
his terrible death at Medicine Hat,
N. W. T. Engaged in railway con-
struction work, he fell from a river
bank and four days later was found
frozen in the ice. Thomas Arm-
strong was a native of Sydenham
township, 42 years of age, and resided
near Woodford until four years
ago, when he went West, and from
whence he was destined never to
return alive. The remains were
brought to Owen Sound on Thursday
last and were laid to rest in Annan
cemetery. The unfortunate man was
foreman of a C. P. R. construction
gang at Danesmore Junction, and had
been at a station two miles from
Medicine Hat con-ulting with some
of the railway men. He missed the
returning train and decided to walk
to town. In a blinding snowstorm he
evidently lost the path and fell over
an embankment, six feet, to the ice
below, which had formed on the river.
He is supposed to have been stunned
by the fall, and when found was em-
bedded in the ice, with only one
shoulder and a portion of one leg ex-
posed to view. The deceased gentle-
man had just secured three months'
leave of absence and was prepared to
leave for his old home to spend the
winter months. Mr. Armstrong
leaves one brother, Robert, of Wood-
ford, and three sisters—Mrs. Gilbert
Best, Woodford; Mrs. Jas. Hood,
Iowa, and a sister living in Toronto.
He was unmarried, very popular both
in Woodford and in the West, and
his untimely death is sincerely re-
gretted by all who know him.—Mea-
ford Mirror.

LEROY GETS 6 YEARS.

Meaford Express.

Six years in the Kingston peniten-
tiary was the sentence passed by
Magistrate Denison on Friday upon
William J. Leroy, who pleaded guilty
to stealing two mail bags while on a
G. T. R. mail car. As stated in our
last issue, Leroy was formerly a
brakesman for the Grand Trunk on
the run between Allandale and Mea-
ford. He was either discharged by
the Company or left its services after
being relieved from duty on this di-
vision. Using his acquaintance
among the men as a lever, he travel-
led in a mail car. About three weeks
ago he kicked a bag of mail matter
out of a car at Mimico and a week or
so later repeated the performance by
dropping a mail bag out of the car
near Parkdale station and returned
to ride them of their contents.

"This is a very serious charge,"
said the Magistrate, "and the lowest
term is three years. Parliament has
been very severe on this class of
crime. I sentence you to six years
in the Kingston Penitentiary on each
charge, the sentences to run concurren-
tly."

Post Office Inspector Henderson
prosecuted on behalf of the Govern-
ment. The letters, it will be remem-
bered, were found open and thrown
into a water tank at the Iroquois
Hotel, Toronto.
