Deceased was admitted with three or four other old women from Owen Sound jail, in August of last year, where she has been retained for six years previous as a homeless, friendless and helpless indigent. She was of unsound mind, but harmless, and we trust she now lies in peace.

Donald Leitch, discharged at his own request in July last, was readmitted on the 13th inst. Donald returned much the worse of his few months' freedom. He is past the stage in life in which to earn a livelihood and we doubt very much whether he will ever again desire to leave the institution. He is a very sick man at present.

Alexander McLellan, discharged last spring, returned to the home for another three and a half month's sojourn on Saturday night last. Mac looks better now than we ever saw him before. He says he can manage all right through the spring and summer months but cannot navigate in winter. There are a few light chores to be done here which will fill up the intervals when not reading. We understand that Mrs. Criezer recently discharged from this institution, was immediately after her arrival in Bay City, Mich., sent to the county poor house of that place, having no responsible friends there to take care of her. It appears that long ago she had been a resident of that place for years, and had buried her husband there, and by her statements of having friends there who desired that she should go there to reside with them, and that she desires to be buried beside her husband, as well as having money and promissory notes of her own, she managed to get her discharge from this institution. It now remains to be seen whether she will be reported or kept where she is.

Collegiate's Open Lit

A large audience filled the assembly Hall of the Collegiate Institute on Wednesday evening and departed well pleased with the program presented by the students. The entertainment opened with a well rendered glee by the Glee Club, which made excellent progress under the leadership of Mr. Willard. A piano duet by Misses Legate and Cruickshank followed, which was well received. The medals won at the senior and junior leaving examinations last July were presented to the winners. Mr. Murray presented Dr. Lang's medal to Mr. A. Weir, who was called on for a speech and made a neat reply. Dr. Burt's medal was presented by Inspector Burgess to Miss Evelyn Carrie and Judge Hatton's to Miss Amy Edge; Mr. T. I. Thomson making the presentation. 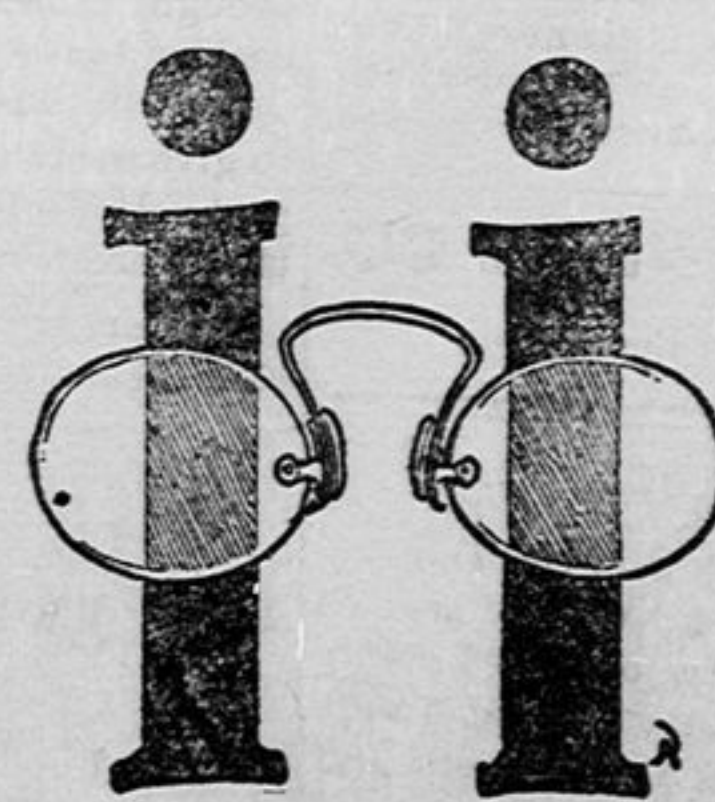
