Mr. George M. Ross, engineer at Machine Oil, Harness Oil, Casket Factory, was killed under terribly sad circumstances on Friday afternoon about three o'clock. It was noticed that the steam did not seem to be acting properly and one went to the engine room to see what was the matter. A terrible sight met his gaze, the engineer lay beside the big fly-wheel dead, his head above the mouth battered off, one arm badly broken and torn and the body otherwise mangled.
