THE United States is "it" again to the extent of 'steen inches of space in each of the daily papers. It was reported that somebody was going to blow up the American fleet, and, immediately, in the well-known cross-the-border style, cablegraph, telegraph and telephone messages were proclaiming to the world how close we had been to another great catastrophe. Even the names of the anarchists, the place of destruction, and the whole paraphernalia receives considerable attention, and a person can witness the disaster in its entirety, minus the report and powder fumes, so vivid is the description of our friends across the line. Since the Americans have cooled down long enough to let some one else use the cables, it is learned that the rumor started from a snatch of conversation overheard on a Paris, France telephone line, and is not being taken at all seriously by the people of that city.

A RE-COUNT of the ballots cast on the Local Option By-Law is to take place on the 6th of February, on the application of Mr. Murphy, of Markdale, owner of the Middaugh House. With a majority of twenty-eight in favor of local option it is hard to conceive of sufficient spoiled ballots to defeat the By-law, and we cannot imagine what good is to come out of the scrutiny. Some contend the majority is only a fraction over eleven votes, which is quite true from their way of reckoning, but our contention is, and has been that their reckoning is wrong. There seems no way of defeating the by-law unless twenty-nine votes in favor of the measure be disallowed. The Pioneer, the organ of the temperance party, publishes an opinion which were produce elsewhere. It agrees with our view exactly. On the other hand we are told that Mr. James Haverson, the legal advisor of the liquor party is of the same opinion. If every disallowed ballot be taken from the "total vote polled" and the 60% bases be reckoned on the reduced total vote facts and figures must count in determining the result.
