THE Town Council is shaping towards securing a site for a new town hall and market place and options have been taken on a couple of places, one being the Edge lot opposite Laidlaw's and another on the river flat to the south of the new railway line, corner of Queen and George streets. ### L. O. L. MEETINGS

Robert Birmingham, former organizer of the Conservative party, was in town over Sunday. He is no stranger in Durham as he has been here in connection with the party work for the past twenty-five years.

He is now organizer for the L. O. L. for Western Ontario, his territory extending from the County of Durham in the east to the Lake of the Woods in the west.

Here under the auspices of the County Lodge of South Grey, he addressed lodges at Harrison, Mt. Forest, Minto, Cedarville, Damascus, and Durham, and at the County Lodge Meeting at Durham on Tuesday afternoon.

At the public meeting here Saturday night, Mr. Birmingham spoke for about an hour and a half along patriotic and strong protestant lines, showing the progress and development of the organization in Canada for the past seventy-five years. William of Orange was taken as the central figure, around whose valor and greatness he ascribes much of the glory of the British Empire of to-day.

We have 2000 Orange Lodges in Canada with an active membership of over 100,000, besides many adherents who were actively engaged in former days.

Tolerance towards all and the protection of every man in his rights are foundation principles upon which the superstructure of Orangeism has been so nobly erected. Notwithstanding the protective and tolerant character of the organization, a strong stand is taken against political Romanism and Jesuitical power.

Such men as the late Sir John A. McDonald, Sir John Abbott, Sir MacKenzie Bowell, Hon. John Hiliard Cameron, Sir Henry Strong, Chief Justice of Canada, Hon. N. C. Wallace Edward F. Clarke, M. P., and others of the foremost writers and thinkers in Canada, including Dr. Goldwin Smith, who must be acknowledged to day as the great master of English Literature and English thought, were all identified with Orangeism. He also referred to the fact that the leaders of all the great religious bodies in the old country identified themselves with the principles of Orangeism. The association is growing very rapidly in the new Western provinces, three hundred lodges having been established there during the past few years.

He spoke vigorously on the inconsistent character of professed protestant parliamentary representatives who had voted to shackle the new provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan with the bane of separate schools, and incidentally gave some hard knocks to Mr. H. H. Miller, who took so active a part in this connection. He also showed how our present premier of protestant Canada, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, had gone to Rome twice to consult the papal authorities, before granting them a Constitution.

The unfavorable weather was the cause of a smaller attendance than was expected, but Mr. Birmingham will be back to the County in April to visit the lodges, when those who failed to be present will have another opportunity to hear him.

County Master James Eden occupied the chair very acceptably. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to the speaker and chairmen.
