He believes that there is more fuel in ash-heaps than the ordinary citizen likes to think about and maintains Pumps. that if all the ash piles in town were set on fire at one and the same time that our citizens would be obliged to emigrate farther north to escape the sultry climate. He has already convinced his neighbors that they are throwing more wealth out the back door than some men take in the front, and by repeated demonstrations they are coming to look upon him as a twenieth centuary wonder. But Mr. Woodmam says in his own modest manner, which those who know the man will believe is not assumed, that there is nothing remarkable about burning coal ashes. It seemed extraordinary, but it is none the less true, that the average man can't tell an ash pile from a coal heap. What we ordinary call an ash pile is nothing else than a singed coal heap. It looks white-is white and therefore fools the people. Mr. Woodman sifts white material Funeral Director from the rest of the ash-pile and without adding salt, lime or other ingredient, throws it into the stove. For a quick fire it takes the cake, and while it may not burn as long as the crude coal, yet while it lasts it throws out a heat that cannot be excelled by any known fuel. Here we have the secret of the Altoona cobbler-as long as the ash pile contained particles of coal, it was possible with salt and water to burn the ashes. Mr. Woodman produces the same, and probably better effect, by stfting the ashes and burning the coal,-Walkerton Times.
