County Council.

(Continued from last week)

When the members re-assembled on Wednesday morning the clerk read a number of accounts and communications, among which were the following:—A statement from the county treasurer as to the non-resident land fund for 1907; a letter from A. G. MacKay, K. C., county solicitor, relative to the arbitration respecting the county line of Grey and Bruce; presentment of the grand jury at the December sessions; letter from ex warden Pedwell and the warden of Bruce dealing with the Stone bridge; applications from the Prisoner's Aid Association, the Salvation Army Rescue Workers and J. Ross Robertson for the Sick Children's Hospital, all asking for financial aid; circular relative to the establishment of a hospital for consumptives; draft of a memorial from county council of Middlesex asking legislation to amend section 606 of Municipal Act; also draft of memorial asking to have supplementary revenue act of 1899 amended; applications to be appointed as auditors from W. H. Jenkins, Jas. S. Rowe, A. F. Armstrong and George Einnie; letter from James Leslie relative to the temporary bridge over Pottawatamie; letter from A. McCabe claiming \$100 for use of land as roadway while a county bridge was being built, all of which were referred to the several committees for consideration.

THURSDAY MORNING.

A large number of accounts were presented and read by the clerk on resuming business Thursday morning. Also a letter from the county treasurer dealing with the finances of the county. A circular from the Good Roads Association; a report from H. H. Burgess, public school inspector; report from Dr. Ego, physician to the House of Refuge; report from Thos. Harness, keeper of the House of Refuge.

Mr. R. Agnew presented report No. 1 of the finance committee which recommended that \$50 be granted to the Hospital for Sick Children; \$50 to the Salvation Army Rescue work and \$10 to the Prisoner's Aid Association; the fying of the county treasurer's report as to the non-resident land funds; that the grand petit jurors be paid \$2.50 per day and that the grand jury at the spring assizes be requested to visit the House of Refuge and that their expenses be paid by the county. The report was adopted.

J. H. Stephenson submitted a report from the House of Refuge committee recommending for payment a number of accounts.

By-law No. 715, to appoint county auditors; by law No. 716, to appoint members of the judicial audit; by law No. 717, to appoint a school trustee for Owen Sound Collegiate Institute and by-law No. 718, to appoint a trustee for the Meaford High School were introduced and read the statutory number of times. The several by-laws were filled in as follows:—For auditors, Messrs George Binnie and James S. Rowe; for members of judicial audit, John Legate and Jas. Ochrane; for school trustee for Owen Sound, James Leslie and for Meaford, Fred Abbott.

THURSDAY EVENING.

Reports from the public school inspectors S. Huff and N. W. Campbell, were received and read by the clerk, together with several accounts.

James Erskine presented report No. 1 of the road and bridge committee recommending that \$15 be accepted from W. S. Bishop of Brooke in payment for temporary bridge over the Pottawatamie. It was also agreed to abide the decision of the railway and municipal board in regard to the deviation between the counties of Grey and Bruce in the townships of Bentinck and Normanby.

By law Nos. 715, 716, 717 and 718 were given their third reading and finally passed.

On motion of Dr. Lang and R. Agnew the council put itself on record as being in favor of the railway connection between Owen Sound and Meaford.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Chairman R. Agnew presented his second report from the finance committee recommending the fying of the communication from Woodstock, relative to the establishment of consumptive hospitals and the taking of no action in the matter at present. Messrs Hastie, Muir, McDonald, Hampton, McKnight, Garvie and the warden were named a special committee to recommend some method of having the county assessment adjusted. The report also recommended that the Ontario legislature be memorialized to have the municipal act so amended as to provide for rural municipalities being assessed when the snow is off the ground. The warden and clerk were authorized to prepare such memorial.

Report No. 2 of the road and bridge committee recommended for payment a number of accounts and that a committee composed of Messrs J. Eaton, D. Sinclair, J. Legate and W. Taylor investigate into the working of Good Roads systems were now adopted, and that the clerk procure all possible information as to the machinery required with cost of same, for road construction under government system. \$75 was set aside as full compensation to Wm. McCabe for use of roadway through his property during the erection of a bridge in Glenelg township; Messrs. Norman and Taylor were appointed to examine the bridge on the county line between Grey and Simcoe.

Messrs. Hatten, Hampton and Erskine were instructed to examine the bridge over the Spey north of Chats worth and if necessary have a steel or cement structure erected.

The committee on communications and memorials recommended through its chairman, S. R. McKnight, that the warden and one other member attend the conference of the National Sanitarium Association in Toronto on March 4th, that the warden and clerk have a petition filled up and signed by themselves to be forwarded to the lieutenant governor in-council asking to have section 606 of the Municipal Act amended so as not to impose such heavy burdens upon municipalities; and that no action be taken relative to amending the Revenue Act of 1899.

The special committee appointed to consider the equalization of the assessments for county purposes submitted the following as the basis on which the county levies should be made:—Artemesia, \$1,646,200; Bentinck, \$1,860,200; Collingwood, \$1,899,700; Derby, \$1,100,000; Egremont, \$2,050,000; Euphrasia, \$1,761,000; Glenelg, \$1,100,000; Holland, \$1,400,000; Keppel, \$1,250,000; Normanby, \$2,500,500; Osprey, \$1,600,000; Proton, \$1,870,500; Sarawak, \$471,900; St. Vincent, \$1,958,000; Sullivan, \$2,013,500; Sydenham, \$1,958,000; Owen Sound, \$3,500,000; Meaford, \$700,000; Durham, \$450,000; Hanover, \$450,000; Markdale, \$225,000; Thornbury, \$200,000; Dandak, \$200,000; Neustadt, \$115,000; Chatsworth, \$100,000.

Dr. McCullough was appointed to accompany the warden to Toronto on March 4th.

The warden, James Wilson and D. H. Sinclair were appointed a special committee to work in conjunction with the Bruce county committee in the construction of the steel bridge at Soone.

Messrs. Harrison, McClelland, McFadden, Weber and Schenk were appointed a committee to enquire into the treasurer's surties.

SATURDAY MORNING.

Neil McDonald presented a report from the county property committee which recommended numerous accounts for payment. Messrs. Saunders, Hastie, Schenk and McDonald were appointed to enquire into the matter of an extension to the registry office at Durham and act as they deemed advisable. Messrs. McClelland, Lemon, Legate and McDonald were instructed to purchase necessary supplies and have repairs made to the county buildings at Owen Sound.

Walter Hastie read a report from the education committee recommending the payment of accounts and the receiving of reports from the public school inspectors.

J. S. Wilson reported for the printing committee in favor of the payment of a number of accounts and the acceptance of the tender of the Standard Printing Co., of Markdale, to print the minutes as per specifications at 59c a page.

J. H. Stephenson, chairman of House of Refuge committee, reported in favor of purchasing fifty five acres south of present farm at \$1200.

By-laws Nos. 719 and 720 to provide for an increase in the pay of grand and petit jurors, and for the payment of the grand jury's expenses to Markdale when visiting the House of Refuge, were introduced and read the statutory number of times and finally passed.

The messenger boy was paid \$1 per day for attendance at the several sessions.

A motion was made by Messrs. Fred Harrison and H. Lemon that R. McDowall, C. E., be appointed to examine all county bridges which have not been made permanent structures and to report as to the nature of the present structures and the probable life of each and to give an estimate as to the cost of a new permanent bridge for each place, also dimensions of the same and report at the June session.

In amendment J. S. Wilson and T. Dodsworth moved that all commissioners report as to the conditions of all county bridges in their division and report at June session to road and bridge committee, who shall make a note of the condition when weak bridges may be examined.

The amendment carried. The clerk was instructed to have a copy of the latest government report on the highway improvement forwarded to each member of the council.

The warden and clerk were instructed to prepare and forward a memorial to the Ontario government asking for a liberal grant to aid in building the proposed railway connecting Meaford and Owen Sound.

A motion to hold the June session at Markdale was lost and one to meet at Owen Sound carried.

The session closed with the singing of God Save the King.

FEET FROZEN.

There was nearly a fatality in town from the bitter cold of Wednesday night last week. The story as we can piece it together, is something like this: David Bell, who came to Canada from Ireland in October, obtained employment in Gray's factory, Harriston. He quit work there with \$30 wages in hand, and delirium tremens ensued. He came over to Mt. Forest on Wednesday morning, laboring under the delusion that he was pursued by parties who wanted to shoot him. He was poorly clad and lurked about the station most of the day. At tempting or threatening to cut his own throat with his pocket knife, he was taken in charge by Chief Foreman and put in the Town Hall for safe keeping. About 8 o'clock he was allowed to go outside by the Chief, but could not get in again, and succeeded in getting away. Later a search was instituted and he was found about 11 o'clock on Tanner's Flats. Brought back it was found that both his feet were badly frozen. Next day he was sent to Guelph General Hospital in charge of W. W. Bye. All his toes will probably have to be taken off. It is well he was rescued as he would undoubtedly have frozen to death before morning.—Mt. Forest Confederate.
