**CANADA'S TURN NOW.**

A few weeks ago that eminent ex-  
Canadian, James J. Hill, said that  
New York had reached its limit in  
the world's shipping, and that in  
future the increase in water shipping  
to the Atlantic must be via the St.  
Lawrence. In his annual report to  
the New York State Government,  
Superintendent of Public Works  
Stevens recommends that Congress  
be memorialized at its next session  
to join with New York in construct-  
ing a new deep waterway from Lake  
Ontario to the Hudson. This is to  
offset the proposed Canadian scheme  
of a canal from Georgian Bay to  
Montreal. Mr. Hill thinks that the  
Hudson cannot hope to compete with  
the St. Lawrence. Mr. Stevens  
thinks that the St. Lawrence ought  
not to be allowed to become a serious  
competitor with the Hudson. The  
Georgian Bay waterway, via the  
French River, Lake Nipissing and  
the Ottawa River, makes a total  
canal scheme of 440 miles, of which  
all but 357 miles are navigable water,  
leaving a balance of 83 miles of  
the French River to be canalized at  
a cost of \$13,799,589. and 55 1/2 miles  
of river improvement. This is prac-  
tically retracing backwards the fam-  
ous voyage of Champlain and another  
proof that the great carrier highways  
whether by land or water on this  
continent stick pretty close to the  
routes of the red man. This route,  
with a saving of distance by 806  
miles over the route via New York,  
is second in future importance to the  
ultimate Hudson's Bay route, with a  
saving of more than a thousand miles  
as compared with the St. Lawrence  
route. A secondary United States  
scheme puts the Hudson still further  
in competition with the St. Lawrence  
route by a waterway from Montreal  
to New York by way of the Richelieu  
River, Lake Champlain and the Hud-  
son. At the United States' end of  
Lake Champlain this would cost  
\$30,000,000 and \$7,000,000 at the  
Canadian end. The whole of the  
capital for this project has been  
subscribed.

**Railways Killed 402.**

A summary respecting railway acci-  
dents shows that 402 persons were  
killed and 144 injured in Canada, be-  
tween February 1, 1904, and March 31  
1906. The respective figures for three  
lines are: G.T.R., 167 and 40; C.P.R.  
185 and 59; C.N.R., 27 and 24.

Of the killed 109 were trespassing  
on the track, 42 were killed at level  
crossings, 38 employees were killed  
while shunting, and 15 passengers  
were killed while attempting to get  
on a train while in motion. Fifteen  
passengers and nine employees were  
killed from head-on collisions, and 2  
passengers and three employees injur-  
ed.

Rear-end collisions killed 17 passen-  
gers and 15 employees. The killed in-  
cludes 73 passengers, 168 employees and 16  
"other persons."

Because of the increase in the Rail-  
way Board's work, inspectors are like-  
ly to be appointed and stationed at  
various points in Canada to further  
the Board's work.

**African Hospitality.**

Hospitality may be considered as one  
of the characteristics of not only the  
Veis, but of the whole African race. It  
is considered the duty of every citizen  
to entertain strangers without the  
smallest compensation. Places of rest  
stand always open, and when these  
are found occupied by strangers a man  
goes and tells his wife, who will send  
her servants with water for the stran-  
gers to wash their feet, for, as they  
wear no shoes, they naturally need  
such an accommodation. Afterward  
rooms and cloth wrappers are given  
them, food is brought from all quar-  
ters or they are invited to eat with  
the people. They continue to be so  
provided for even if they stay months.  
Their garments are also washed and  
returned to them. On leaving they  
generally make a small gift to the  
wife of the host, though not more than  
two or three cola nuts or two or three  
English pennies.—Century.

**Artemesia Council.**  
(Flesherton Advance)

The Municipal Council of the town-  
ship of Artemesia met in the town  
hall, Flesherton, on Saturday, the  
8th day of February, 1908. The  
members were all present except Mr.  
McKenzie. The minutes of last ses-  
sion were read and confirmed.

Communications as follows were  
presented and read:—Fred Deagle,  
re road in concession 10; W.J. Lever,  
account for work at town hall; Muni-  
cipal World, account for assessment  
rolls and stationary; County Treasur-  
er, list of lands liable to be sold for  
taxes in 1908. The Auditors' Report  
was also presented.

Carson—Best—That the Auditors'  
Report as finally passed by this coun-  
cil be adopted and 150 printed copies  
be procured.—Carried.

Wright—Carson—That this council  
are of the opinion that the time has  
arrived when it is necessary to take  
active measures to improve the con-  
dition of our winter roads and think  
that the bonusing of wire fences  
would be advantageous in this re-  
spect, and further we would invite  
the public to be present at the next  
session of this council on the first  
Saturday in March next, between 2  
and 3 o'clock p.m. to give the matter  
consideration and full discussion.—  
Carried.

Carson—Best—That the account of  
Charles Mosier duly certified by local  
Board of Health, \$10.50, for attending  
on S. Colquett's family while under  
quarantine be paid.—Carried.

Wright—Carson—That W. J. Lev-  
er's account, \$10.50, for wood for  
town hall be paid.—Carried.

Carson—Wright—That the account of  
the Municipal World for assess-  
ment rolls and forms and stationary,  
\$15.57, be paid.—Carried.

Wright—Best—That Bloomfield  
Ferris be paid \$2.65 for work and  
timber used on bridge at Loucks'  
mill, as certified by ex-Councillor  
Meads.—Carried.

Carson—Wright—That the follow-  
ing be paid, being for work on bridge  
at Loucks' mill under Mr. Meads:  
Isaac Sinclair, \$2.63; Robt. Wright,  
\$2.63.—Carried.

Best—Carson—That late Councillor  
Meads be paid as follows for overseer-  
ing work on Loucks' bridge two days  
at \$2.00 = \$4.00 and 80 cts. for spikes  
used.—Carried.

Best—Carson—That Engineer Mc-  
Dowall be paid \$17.36 for services in  
connection with Colquett ditch and  
the same be charged to the parties  
interested as awarded by engineer in  
charge.—Carried.

Council adjourned.
