To do this the ad. writer should stop long enough to think, and having considered he should put his thoughts into words that would appeal to the purchasing public. Stringing a few sentences together at hap hazard isn't going to produce the best results, inst. An ad. may be ever so well worded and spoiled when put in type. The compositor should have some artistic ideas, and make every ad. stand out so as to have some feature to arrest the attention of the buyer. To do this, the compositor must have time; he can't crowd two days' work into one and produce the best results for the advertiser. The reason a merchant advertises is to tell the public what he has to sell and to induce them to buy. Interment took place on Monday to Dornoch R. C. Cemetery.


