Deer Captured in Grand Valley.

A large deer capering through the village is not of every day occurrence. Yet one came bounding along on Saturday morning, causing no end of excitement. John Graham first noticed it passing his place, apparently following the creek bed down towards the river, with three spotted dogs in full pursuit. It came out on Amaranth street at Dr. Berwick's, and jumping along ran up to the door of John Brown's blacksmith shop, where it stood for some time. As soon as the cry of the dogs became audible again, away it dashed through the back yards, and coming out on Main street, between Swain's hotel and the Bailey block. Taking the east sidewalk it passed down as far as McIntyre's store where it turned, and going through A. Richardson's yards crossed the river below the dam. By this time there was a good following of men and boys, who gave chase, and some of the more athletic ones caught up to it in the deep snow across the river. Jumping the fence, it came to the bottom of the hill near the old lime-kiln, and fell, completely done out. It offered no resistance as it was placed on a sleigh and taken to the Commercial stables, where it died in a few minutes. The circumstances were so strange that a post mortem was held a day or so afterwards, which showed that within a short time before, very likely that morning, the deer had received a charge of buckshot just below the back bone, the charge going in one side and coming out another. From the angle and location of the shot it is surmised the hunter came on the deer at close range. Instinct no doubt made the animal follow the creek, knowing it must lead to a larger body of water, which deer always seek when wounded, to throw the dogs off the trail. The owner of two of the dogs in the chase is known, but regarding the other it is not so clear. Quite possibly there would be some satisfaction in having him punished for allowing his dogs to run at large where deer are known to frequent. But the specimen that most needs attention is the one who shot the deer. During the last five years deer have increased very largely in Luther, until now there are two or three good sized droves. Only on Tuesday morning were nine seen together.—Star-Vidette.

Nearly a Wreck.

Tuesday afternoon of last week a bad accident on this line of railway was narrowly averted. A tender was left standing on the track north of the station while the engine was being fastened it started off North down the grade of its own accord, and soon gained considerable speed. Markdale was telegraphed and the afternoon express from Owen Sound had just time to side track at Markdale when the tender flew past. An engine was sent in pursuit and one of the employees by a quick act succeeded in attaching the engine to the tender and bringing it to a stop just north of the town without any damage having been done.—Flesher-ton Advance.

Was Successfully Operated.

The big rotary snow plow in which a considerable amount of local capital has been invested arrived in town on Friday night from doing service on the Proton-Walkerton branch line, which has been blocked all winter. The plow did excellent service, notwithstanding the extraordinary conditions which existed on the branch, and demonstrated that when it came up against the ordinary snow blockade it would prove the correctness of the principles of its construction. An unfortunate break in the frame of one of the big engines which operates the mechanism put it out of business, though its services will not be required again this season. During the summer the repairs will be made and such changes as the operation which the initial experiences have demonstrated carried out. Mr. James M. Wilson of the Owen Sound Iron Works, was recently appointed vice-president of the company which owns the patents and the machine and there is a possibility that future construction may be carried on here.—Times.

He told of being in the Duncan House Friday morning, when he took a trunk away. Later he called again and took them back to the brewery. He had done it for a joke on the amateur detective. 'Jerry' Hicks corroborated part of the story. The joke seems to have worked, for the inspector made a careful search the same day. His Worship in dismissing the case, remarked that the trick was quite appropriate to the day.—O. S. Sun.

Severe Electrical Storm.

An electrical storm of unusual severity, considering the time of year, passed over this locality last Friday night, Mar. 27, and did some damage to property. Mr. James McPherson, of the 10th con., Proton, had one of his herd of shorthorns killed, a splendid cow, valued at one hundred and fifty to two hundred dollars. A peculiar thing about it was that the cow was picked out of the centre of the stone stable, numerous other cattle and horses being tied on all sides of her. It has not been discovered yet where the lightning entered the building. The stall partition next to the cow was thrown twenty feet away. None of the other animals were injured although the beast standing next was loose from the stall. The marks in the board partition were like a number of good sized bullet holes. It is a fortunate thing that barn and contents were not destroyed as Mr. McPherson has a lot of valuable stock. The Riverview correspondent tells also of some damage done by lightning down there.—Dundalk Herald.
