Flesherton.

Notwithstanding the bad roads there was a large attendance of ladies at the monthly meeting of the Women's Institute in the town hall on Tuesday afternoon of last week. The meeting was of a specially interesting character, the subject for discussion being 'Patriotism—Our Flag.' Mrs. (Rev.) Caldwell gave a paper of special merit and Mrs. (Dr.) Carter followed with a deeply interesting address. At the close of the meeting a tea was served and the ladies had a very enjoyable social hour. The members of the Flesherton branch are enthusiastic in their work and the Institute is in a prosperous condition.

Miss McGriffin, of Toronto, representative of the Methodist Women's Missionary Society, gave an instructive and deeply interesting address in the Methodist church on Friday evening last. Miss McGriffin, though suffering with a severe cold, spoke over an hour and there wasn't a dull sentence in the whole of her address. The speaker, who last visited this place nearly twenty years ago, conveyed greetings to the auxiliary from Mrs. (Rev.) Shelton, of Toronto, who was then an active worker here. Miss McGriffin, who has a wide knowledge of the missionaries in the home and foreign field, said that for self sacrifice and heroism in their work she would give the palm to Rev. Samuel and Mrs. Gaudin who have for years been faithfully laboring in the far north of our Dominion. Rev. Dr. Caldwell presided. Mrs. W. Matheson of Port Dover, gave a splendidly rendered solo and Miss Ethel Trimble, Miss Florence Thurston and Dr. Murray gave a pleasing trio.

Word has been received here of the death at Summerland, B. C., on March 23rd of Mr. George Dale, an old resident of Armetesia. About 26 years ago Mr. Dale sold his farm on the west back line to the late Wm. Parker and moved to Manitoba settling near Portage la Prairie where he prospered. About a year ago his health failed and he moved to British Columbia to enjoy the salubrious climate there. Mr. Dale, who was in his 87th year, was a native of England. He was an upright and highly respected man, one of the founders of the Baptist church here and gave liberally of his means to the support of the gospel.
