## POLITICS IN NORTH GREY.

Hon. A. G. MacKay's Opponent May  
Be George Carnahan.

Owen Sound, April 30.—The polit-  
ical situation in North Grey is in-  
teresting indeed so far as the Con-  
servative party is concerned.

For the legislature two candidates  
seek the task of opposing Hon. A. G.  
MacKay. George M. Boyd, ex M. L.  
A., is ready to enter the contest, but  
a large element in the party do not  
want to place their money on a  
thrice beaten horse, and are looking  
with confidence to George Carnahan,  
the brilliant young orator from Meaford.  
Mr. Carnahan certainly has  
some elements of strength which  
makes his nomination desirable. He  
could carry Meaford and St. Vincent  
in all probability by a substantial  
majority. This would off-set Mr.  
MacKay's strength in Sydenham and  
Owen Sound. With Sarawak, a  
strong Tory township, balancing  
Derby, Sullivan and Keppel, it would  
look like a neck and neck race be-  
tween Carnahan and MacKay.

For the federal nomination there is  
also a peculiar situation. T. I.  
Thomson, ex M. P., of Owen Sound,  
has suffered one defeat, but by many  
has been regarded as the logical  
choice of the convention. A strong  
element of the party have, however,  
determined to dispose of their string  
of "selling platers," and take on new  
blood. Hence ex-Mayor W. S. Mid-  
dlebro of Owen Sound has announced  
his candidacy for the nomination,  
and his following is growing. He is  
a young barrister, a splendid plat-  
form speaker, and no doubt would  
make a strong run.

That T. I. Thomson fears Mr. Mid-  
dlebro's success at the convention is  
indicated by the fact that the former  
threatens to run as an independent if  
not regularly nominated. Mr. Thom-  
son's strength, stripped off the party  
nomination is however, problematic.  
The threat, too, some Conservatives  
regard as a sort of party repudiation,  
and it may act as a boomerang.

The convention will be held on May  
6. It is worth watching.

## SHEEP SCAB.

How to Know Disease and How to  
Cure It.

Cause.—The disease is caused by a  
mite which picks the skin of the  
sheep, causing a scab to form under  
which the mite lives.

Symptoms.—The animal is restless.  
They scratch and bite themselves  
and rub against fences, etc. The  
fleece looks tufted or matted and  
portions of it are pulled out by the  
sheep with its mouth. If the hand  
is held to the sheep's nose while it  
is being scratched the animal will com-  
mence nibbling. This is one sure  
symptom of the disease.

Effects.—The fleece falls out, usu-  
ally beginning at the shoulders and  
working backward and downward.  
Ewes may abort or if lambs are car-  
ried to full time they are likely to  
be weak and unthrifty.

Treatment.—Dip all animals and  
spray all buildings where affected  
sheep have been housed. Sheer  
sheep and put in dipping vat for at  
least two minutes. See that the ani-  
mals are completely submerged at  
least once. A second dipping must  
follow at an interval of seven or ten  
days. Isolate animals from fields or  
lots where disease is suspected for at  
least two months, at the end of  
which time the mites should be dead.

Dips.—Any good stock dip should  
be effective, but the lime and sulphur  
dip is the surest and best.

To make lime and sulphur dip,  
take eight pounds of unslacked lime,  
put in a mortar box or tub and slake  
with water so as to form a lime  
paste, add twenty-four pounds of  
flowers of sulphur and stir well.  
Put this mixture in about 25 gallons  
of water and boil for two hours, stir-  
ring constantly. When boiled strain  
the mixture through sacks and add  
enough water to bring the total  
amount of dip up to 100 gallons. Use  
the dip at a temperature of 100 to  
111 degrees F.
