Some Observations

NOTES AND COMMENTS ON THINGS IN GENERAL.

The insolence of hirelings is often times detrimental to the business interests of the people who are responsible for their getting three squares per day. When a six dollar a week clerk insists on treating people with about as much consideration as he would a rattlesnake, it is more than probable that the customers so used will take the pains to hunt for places more congenial to their peace of mind and feelings when they have a few dollars to spend.

In government positions as well as other vocations will sometimes be found these smart alegs, who, in the discharge of their duty, become obnoxious to the parties with whom they deal, and detrimental to the interests of those they serve.

At House's Point, New York, on Friday, Mrs. M. Pierre, the wife of a wealthy Montreal contractor, who was taking a trip to New York City, was subjected to a most absurd volley of impertinent questions by the emigration officer in charge, and when, during the cross-examination, her patience gave way, the man in the uniform expressed some curiosity as to whether or not she had quarrelled with her husband.

Though a country has, and should have, the right to inquire into the standings of persons passing within its boundaries, the parties on whose shoulders the responsibility is placed, should have enough common sense about their clothes to be able to make a distinction between a person trying to steal their way into the country and the wife of a wealthy contractor traveling en suite with her children on a visit to her father. Better to let a dozen undesirable cross the line unquestioned than to act, as did this over zealous official, by firing at a lady in high social standing a volley

of interrogations that were, to say the least, impertinent and insulting.

Two girls, May Lockerby and Lizzie Hull, of Montreal, lie at the point of death and cannot recover, as the result of a runaway accident in that city on Thursday. A young man, Leslie Cameron, is also badly cut about the head and is in a serious condition, while the driver, Thomas Lockerby, escaped uninjured.

The accident was caused by the Lockerby girl throwing an empty chocolate box at the head of one of the horses, causing the team to run away and collide with a telegraph pole.

The fool who rocks the boat has been with us for many seasons, as well as the other one who didn't know it was loaded, but we have never before had to reckon with the party who throws empty chocolate boxes or other refuse material at the heads of spirited drivers. Why people, and especially girls, let their hilarity run away with their good sense and court death or serious injury just to exercise a foolish prank, is hard to understand, but it seems that they have done so since time began and will do so till Gabriel blows his horn.

Though we express nothing but sympathy for the two young women, who have probably, ere this, passed away, their death was the result of a foolish prank, and we think had they stopped to consider the damage a team of spirited drivers are capable of accomplishing when urged to their utmost by fright and excitement, they would be alive to day.

The number of drowning and shooting accidents, as well as the long list from other causes, should be taken as a warning by our young people to go carefully, and not rush into eternity at the bid end of what was intended to be a harmless bit of fun. But will they?

JACK CADE.

He Was Killed With an Arrow by the Sheriff of Kent.

One of the mysteries of history is that surrounding the arch traitor Jack Cade. Nearly all historians have described him as an Irishman. He was really born in Sussex, where he was a youth a servant to one Sir Thomas Dagre.

This Sir Thomas Dagre, or Dacre, was a Sussex knight of great eminence, who had seats at Hurstmonceux and Heathfield, in that county. Cade has for several centuries been a common name about Mayfield and Heathfield, as is proved as well by numerous entries in the parish registers as by lands and localities designated from that family. After his defeat near London Cade took to the Sussex woods, and he finally would have escaped if his reckless courage had not brought him out into the open.

It is traditionally related that he was engaged in a game of bowls in the garden of a little ale house at Heathfield when a Kentish squire, Sir Alexander Iden, sheriff of Kent, taking him unawares, killed him with an arrow.—London Saturday Review.
