**Jas. Cassidy the Victim.**  
**Dived from a Boat and Never Rose Again.**

Word of another drowning fatality comes from Riversdale. On Monday a number of young men, among them being the Huffman boys, the Vallad boys, and the Cassidy boys, went down to the Mud River, for a day's outing. They had a boat, and some fishing tackle, and were looking forward to a pleasant afternoon of it, fishing and boating. Shortly after arriving at the river, some of the young men stripped off and went in for a swim, while others of them started a game of quoits on the bank. While so engaged, Jas. Cassidy took a header into the water from the boat. He was an expert swimmer and had often done the same trick before. But soon his companions became horrified to notice that he did not reappear on the surface as expected. Some of them jumped in, hoping to be able to render him assistance, but they could not find him. The water at that place is about 14 feet deep, and being for the most part spring water is very cold. Whether he struck something in the water, or whether it was the shock to the system by coming into contact with the cold water, which caused his death is unknown. Deceased was a son of Mr. Wm. Cassidy, who lives at lot 19, con. 2, N. D. R. Greenock, about a mile and a half north of Riversdale. He was a strong, active young man of about 20 years of age.

All five were drawn into the vortex. The father and mother were drowned, the eldest boy saved himself and the two other children.

The woman's body was recovered and over a hundred men are searching the river bed and debris for the body of Wisdom.—London Free Press.

**ASSISTANCE IN DRAINAGE.**

**Farm Drainage Demonstrations.**

The Department of Physics at the Ontario Agricultural College desires to announce the continuance of its previous offer of assistance to farmers in matters pertaining to drainage. For the past three years we have been authorized by the Minister of Agriculture to go out and assist any farmers in making the levels of his lands for drainage purposes, in planning the most advantageous systems of drains, and in calculating the grades and sizes of tile for the different drains. A finished map bearing all the information is sent to the owner. This serves two purposes: first, it is used as a guide in constructing the drains; second, it may be preserved as a record of the exact location of every drain, so that if for any reason it should be necessary in years to come to find any drain it could be done accurately at a moment's notice.

The number of applications for assistance has increased very rapidly, so that last year we had many more than we could attend to. To enable us to meet this increased demand the Minister of Agriculture has this year given us a special appropriation whereby we have been enabled to double our staff for this work.

A new feature is now being added: We have found in the past that frequently the neighbors in the vicinity of the farm being surveyed were interested and wished to observe the operations. This suggested the desirability of making these demonstrations public, and this will be done whenever possible. Anyone interested will be welcome on all occasions. By this means we shall be able to instruct a much larger number in matters pertaining to drainage problems.

Anyone wishing drainage surveying done should apply to Wm. H. Day, Department of Physics, O. A. C., Guelph. The only outlay connected with the work is the travelling expenses of one man, including meals, cartage of instruments and railway fare at one cent a mile each way.

The Department has just issued a new pamphlet on "Farm Drainage Operations," which may be had on application.
