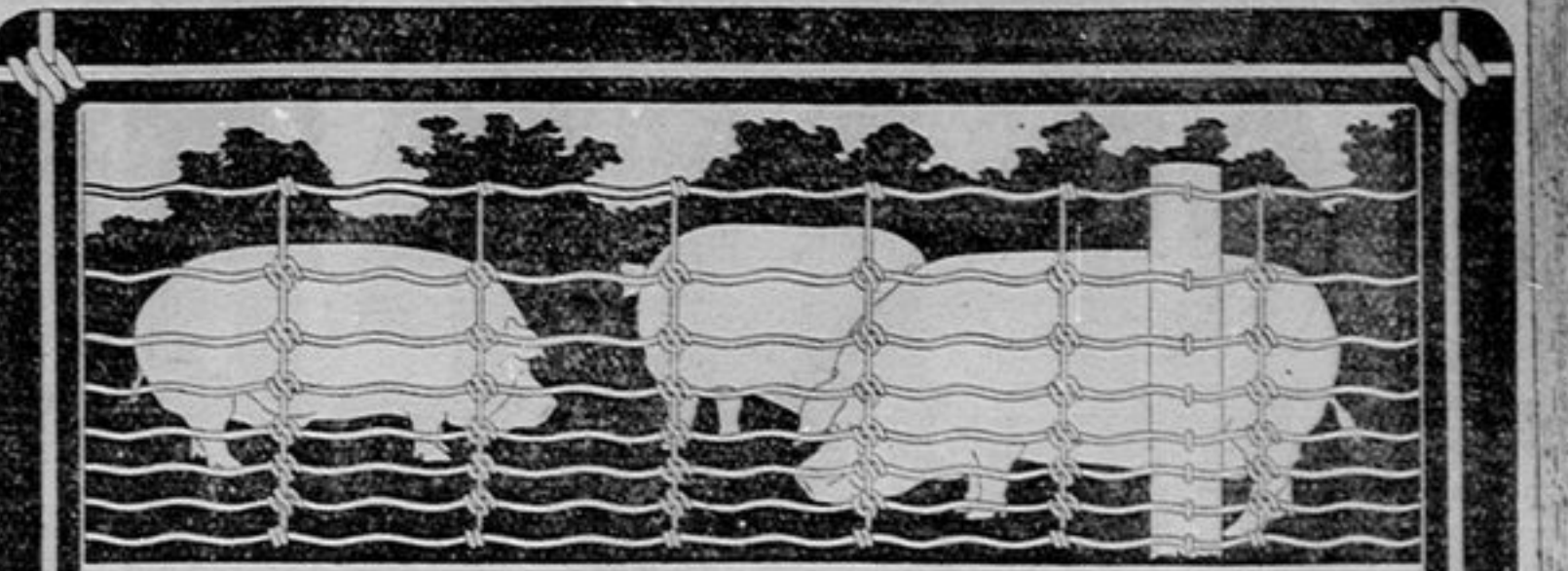

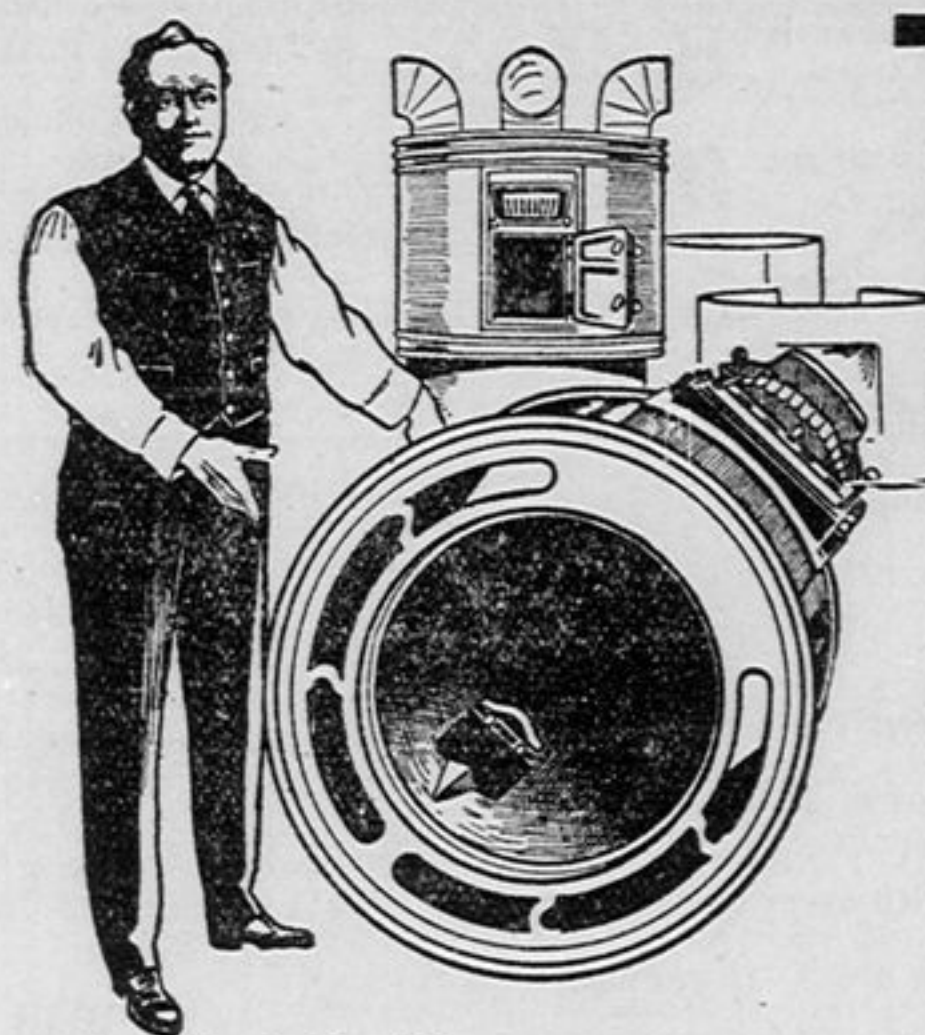

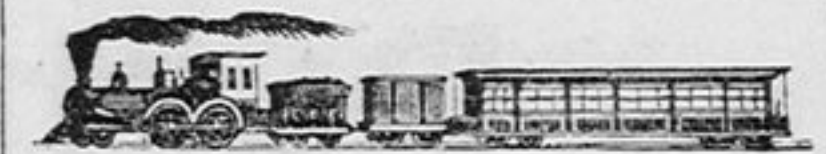

BLOWN FIFTEEN FEET BY THE EXPLOSION.

Mr. R. J. East Died at Shelburne From Injuries Received in Charging Soda Fountain

Shelburne, June 4.—Mr. R. J. East, who was injured yesterday through the explosion of the cylinder of his soda fountain, succumbed to his injuries last night, never having regained consciousness. The boy, Anderson, who was also injured, was taken to the General Hospital in Toronto on this morning's train. His injuries are very serious, one of his arms being so badly broken that amputation may be necessary. The accident occurred in a shed at the back of the store, where the cylinder was being charged from the supply tank. When the explosion took place, Mr. East was blown out the door, head first, about fifteen feet from where he was standing. Anderson was blown into a corner on top of some salt barrels. One of Mr. East's children had been with his father, and he evidently was afraid something would happen, as he had just escorted her out of the shed a few minutes before the explosion took place. Mr. East leaves a wife and three small children, and had only been in possession of the store a couple of weeks.
