Narrowly Escaped Death. Eating kippered herring nearly caused the death of Mr. Dan Stone, 2nd Con. Minto, and his little daughter on Wednesday of last week, and only prompt medical attention saved their lives.

A can of kippered herring was one article on the menu for Wednesday dinner. The herring, so we are informed were turned out of the can into a non-metal dish as soon as opened. Mrs. Stone always being very careful with canned goods in this respect, Mr. Stone ate quite heartily of the herring, and in the course of his meal made casual remark about poisoned canned meat, but did not think there was anything wrong with the herring. His wife and daughter also ate a little of the herring. After dinner Mrs. Stone went over to the next neighbor's and Mr. Stone began plowing in a field between his house and the neighbor's. Some time later in the afternoon Mrs. Stone noticed her husband un- hitch the team and make for the house, apparently with difficulty. Knowing it was an unusual thing for him to stop work at that time of the afternoon her mind at once reverted to the kippered herring, and she hurriedly made her way home. Arriving there she found her husband very ill and her little daughter apparently sleeping.

A neighbor's assistance was at once obtained, and Mr. James McMillan happened to have a horse already hitched at the time, was despatched to Palmerston for a doctor. On the doctor's arrival he found the little girl in a very bad state, with the man in the same condition a few minutes after. Another doctor was sent for, but before his arrival the patients had taken a turn for the better. They both entirely recovered from the effects in the course of a couple of days, but delay in securing a doctor's services would probably have meant death for the two of them.—Clifford Express.

The present age is not much given to speculating in witchcraft, yet those ties were the chief pillars in a building that was believed to be haunted. They came from the old Egremont school, between Priceville and Durham, and the strange noises that issued apparently from the ceiling and rafters of the building alarmed the people in that section, until the schoolhouse was shunned by the natives, and published broad cast over the country as a curiosity. Pictures of the haunted school appeared in many of the daily papers of that date and some twelve years ago it was the most-talked of subject and the most famous building in Egremont. The trustees finally tore it down and erected on the site a substantial brick structure. The story afterwards leaked out that the teacher of the school wanted a new building, but all her reasoning with the board was of no avail. Being somewhat of a ventriloquist, she caused certain weird sounds to come from the rafters and so worked on the feelings of the trustees that they became alarmed at the prospect and disgusted with the building. It never dawned on the board, until after the new school had been erected, that these sounds never issued from the building except when the teacher was present. She gained her object, and the old building was afterwards sold to the C. P. R. From the joists and pillars of this haunted school have come the white washed ties on the South Line.—Bruce Times.
