An Orangeville Fatality.

A fatal accident took place on lot 22, con. 5, Amaranth, on Thursday afternoon, when James Torrance, a highly esteemed farmer of that town- ship, met his death. As quickly as possible willing workers got jackscrews and shovels and released him, but life was extinct. Mr. Torrance leaves a wife and four small children, and the sympathy of the community goes out to them in their bereavement. The remains were interred on Saturday, the funeral being largely attended.—Orangeville Sun.

The collectors for 1907 were paid \$2 each for extra ser- vices in that year, and Wm. H. Arrowsmith was paid 25 cents for coal oil. The council adjourned to July 11th, at 10 a. m.
