Egremont Council.

Council met July 2nd. Minutes adopted. Communications—From the Clerk of Proton asking a supplementary grant of \$75 to be expended on Egremont and Proton townline between Cedarville and Conn.

Hunter—Lothian—Responding to a petition from John Ross and others asking for the reconstruction of McNair's bridge—that the Clerk procure estimates of a combination truss bridge, and Com. Philp examine and report on condition of sub-structure at next meeting—Carried.

Hunter—Ferguson—that the Assessor be paid \$3 for equalizing assessment of U. S. S. No. 14, and \$4.50 for the same at U. S. S. No. 15, A. L. P. and E.—Carried. J. R. Philp, Inspector of drain No. 2, reported on said drain and recommended payment of \$100 to John Ellis. Report adopted. Commissioner's fees, 50¢.

Com. Philp reported in detail the expenditure of \$32.50 in his division and with the Reeve of Arthur they examined townline and bridge at lot 14, which requires immediate attention. Also the highway is in need of repairs, and asked instructions regarding the same. Report adopted, and \$3 Commissioner's fees be paid.—Carried.

Com. Lothian reported expenditure in detail of \$109 in his division. Report adopted. Commissioner's fees, \$5. Com. Ferguson reported expenditure in detail of \$43.30 in his division. Report adopted. Fees \$5.

Com. Hunter reported in detail the expenditure of \$79 in his division. The foregoing expenditures were made chiefly under supervision of the pathmaster by day labor.

Hunter—Philp—that A. McCaw be paid \$3 for tile for drain across the road, lot 3, con. 10, in lieu of culvert, to be paid for when completed.—Carried.

Hunter—Lothian—that a special grant of \$50 be made to Com. Ferguson to expend on Base Line, con. 22.—Carried.

The Clerk was instructed to notify the township engineer to consider himself Inspector of drain No. 4, owing to the death of Mr. Davis Alton, and also to notify all parties interested in the complaint of W. J. McEachern, to appear at next meeting of Council.

The Reeve reported on examining tile molds at Geo. Hamilton's, and recommended the 20¢ molds to be overhauled by Wm. Seaman, which has been done with satisfactory results. Fees \$1.50.

The sum of \$40.68 was paid for gravel accounts, and \$139.75 for sundry accounts, including \$34 for cement for tile, \$33.75, Clerk's quarterly salary, \$50 for Treasurer's half yearly salary, etc.

Council adjourned to meet on Monday, August 3rd. D. ALLAN, Clerk.

Artemesia Council.

Artemesia Council met in the town hall, Flesherston, on Saturday, July 4th, with all the members present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last session read and confirmed. Reports from the Reeve on repairing Weber bridge, and expenditure on valley road; statement from the Standard Bank, showing the balance on deposit of sinking fund, and a petition from Robert Campbell and others, asking a money grant on Campbell's deviation road, were presented and read. By-law No. 634, authorizing a loan of \$2500.00 from the Standard Bank for current expenditure, was introduced and read a first, second and third time and passed.

Wright—Best—that the following accounts for gravel, as certified by overseers, be paid: J. W. Haney, \$7.70, J. Teeter, \$3.60, G. Clark, \$8.35, J. Foster, \$1.—Carried.

McKenzie—Best—that the Reeve and Mr. Carsen be a committee to examine bridge and sink hole on lot 27, con. 2, S. D. R., and take such action as they may deem expedient in the matter.—Carried.

McKenzie—Best—that James Armstrong be paid \$2.50, being commuted statute labor for 1907 for lot 32, con. 11, as certified by Mr. Plantt, overseer for 1908.—Carried.

Carson—Best—that the Reeve and Mr. McKenzie be a committee to examine bridges on Beaver river, con. 8; Reids bridge, 2 N. E. T. and S. R. and bridge at lot 39, con. 6, the same requiring repairs, and to take such action as they may deem expedient to make said bridges safe.—Carried.

McKenzie—Carsen—that D. McLeod be paid his account for supplies for road grader.—Carried.

Carson—McKenzie—that the Reeve's report of expenditure on the Weber bridge be adopted and he be paid \$4.00 for 2 days superintending work, and \$2.00 for his services on committee.—Carried.

McKenzie—Carsen—that the Reeves report of expenditure on the valley road be received and he be paid \$14 for 7 days superintending the work.—Carried.

Best—Carson—that the petition of Robert Campbell et al, requesting a grant for repairs to Campbell's hill be laid over for further consideration.—Carried.

McKenzie—Wright—that Mr. Best make inquiries regarding the cost per cubic yard of placing crushed stone on gravel road near Ceylon and report at next meeting of this Council.—Carried.

Council adjourned.

They poked their balloon, spent the day with Mr. John Connors and took the early train back to Chicago on Monday. Mr. Connors tells many a good story but we will have to go up some day and hear him tell about when the balloon landed at the Grove.—Walkerton Herald.

Charles Scarborough D-d.

After having been a sufferer from rheumatism for over a quarter of a century, Charles Scarborough, of this town crossed the great divide early Tuesday morning, at the advanced age of 78 years and 7 months. He was a quiet, kindly old gentleman, who made many friends in town during his long residence here. Born in Lincolnshire, England, he emigrated to Canada at the age of 20, going direct to Toronto, where he lived until 1863. At Toronto he married the fine old lady who now survives him, along with four sons, Robert, Charles, and George in Toronto, and James in Hanover. In 1863 they moved here and so were among our early settlers. He was engaged in the brick and tile business for a time. About 31 years ago he built the Scarborough House, which has been conducted under that name ever since. Mr. and Mrs. Scarborough celebrated their Golden Wedding in July of last year. The funeral takes place to the Hanover cemetery this afternoon and will be conducted with Masonic honors, deceased having been one of Hanover's first Masons. Rev. G. B. Cox, B. A., rector of St. James's church, will assist in the funeral services. Among those from a distance here for the funeral are: Mr. and Mrs. Robert Scarborough and George and Charles Scarborough, of Toronto, and C. P. Scarborough, of Richmond Hill, the latter being the only relative of deceased in Canada.—Post.

The department of education has at length decided on its model school policy for the coming autumn. The following model schools are to be asked to remain: Kingston, Cornwall, Lindsay, Renfrew, Durham, Minden, Sault Ste. Marie, Port Arthur, Kenora, Bracebridge and Parry Sound. These schools are intended for the preparation of candidates for the new third class certificates (the former district certificates). There will be no fees paid in these schools and the department will pay the board a sum of money in lieu of the legislative and county grants. Three new normal schools will be open for work in September at Stratford, Peterborough and North Bay.

CLEANER POLITICS.

From the Presbyterian. One of the grave dangers of party government is that the party in power by means of strong press support, by the lavish use of patronage, and all the other resources at its command, can finally entrench itself and hold its position even after it has proved unworthy of public trust. There is no stronger card that it can play than the appeal to party loyalty. In constituencies in which the parties are nearly balanced, and in which loyalty to party is made a fetish among the more intelligent men, it is the purchasable rag-tag, which is to be found in any community which holds the balance of power and the temptation to appeal to it becomes in too many cases irresistible. It is this element that provides the sphere for the use of campaign funds and the other means of thwarting the public will. The cure lies in the shifting of the balance of power from the classes to whom it means something to be sold to the highest bidder, to the intelligent classes who can do their thinking. If the intelligent men are independent men, demanding clean and honest administration of public affairs, and prepared to punish misuse of power and trust, they become powerful factors which must be reckoned with, and it will become more and more necessary for the leaders to bid for their support rather than for that of the corrupt element. These men must more clearly realize their personal responsibility for clean and honest government. By being willing to line up at the crack of the party whip they are simply handing over the deciding of the issues in close constituencies to those who can be purchased like sheep. The issues between the two parties in Canada are not so fundamental as to set up impossible barriers. The fundamental thing is that the government of the country shall be in the hands of clean, high minded and honest men, and a steady increase in the number of intelligent and independent voters will mean much for the country's good.
