WHAT IS THE PREMIERSHIP?

Its Meanings, Recognition, and Asso-

ciations as Stated In T.P.'s Weekly.

Everybody knows that the head of a Ministry is called Prime Minister or Premier, but few people quite realize what that means. The Cabinet, of course, has the Premier for its head; the Cabinet grew naturally out of the needs of our national polity; "yet," said Macaulay, "it still continues to be altogether unknown to the law." Now, of course, there is no secrecy about the names of members who constitute the Cabinet; those members are chosen from the leaders of the majority in the House of Commons; the Cabinet, in fact, is practically a chosen body within an elected body. Yet it remains, technically, unknown to the constitution. Quite apart from his position as the Head of the Government, the Premier has extraordinary influence. It is upon his recommendation that the dignitaries of the church are appointed, he has the

right of nomination to over a hundred crown livings-of course, as vacancies occur; and it is he, nominally at least, who confers temporal and honorary distinctions-peerages, baronetcies, even the Garter itself. Yet until quite recently the Premier enjoyed no legal precedence over his fellows, his official position not being recognized by statute. It was only by Royal Warrant dated Dec. 2, 1905, that his precedence was definitely eatablished, and he was given "place and precedence next after the Archbishop of York." Only the Princes of the Blood Royal, the Lord High Chan-
