Williamsford Man Shot.

The little village of Williamsford
was the scene of a very stirring affair
last Saturday night and one which
may result in very serious conse-
quences for some of those concerned.
It appears that for some time a promi-
nent young man of the village has
been greatly annoyed by thieves
breaking into his orchard and stealing
fruit. On Saturday night he thought
he heard some persons moving about
in the orchard at the back of his
house and went out to chase them
away. He took with him a rifle
containing a twenty-two calibre bul-
let and it is alleged that he fired this
gun. The result was that a young
man named Roberts, who was in
company with a companion named
Weinoski in a plot of ground adjoining
the orchard, was shot in the
groin. When he saw his comrade
fall to the ground and observed the
man with the gun, Weinoski rushed
towards him with the intention of
dismaying him. The former, how-
ever, cried out that if he did not stop
where he was he would plug him too.
Such is the story of the shooting
accident, and whether it is absolutely
correct or not, the fact remains that
the unfortunate Roberts was struck
in the groin with a bullet. Dr. Old
ham, of Chatsworth, was summoned
and declared that though the wound
was a serious one there was no im-
mediate danger. Roberts remains in
a critical condition. The event has
created a great sensation in the
usually quiet little village and devel-
opments are daily expected.—O. S.
Times.

Sold Liquor to Minors.
On Friday evening two young men
from a neighboring township were
lodged in the cooler by Chief Cringle
for being drunk, and on Saturday
were given a hearing by Police Mag-
istrate Macgregor. They were fined
\$1.00 and costs each and in their evi-

that they were under age and where
