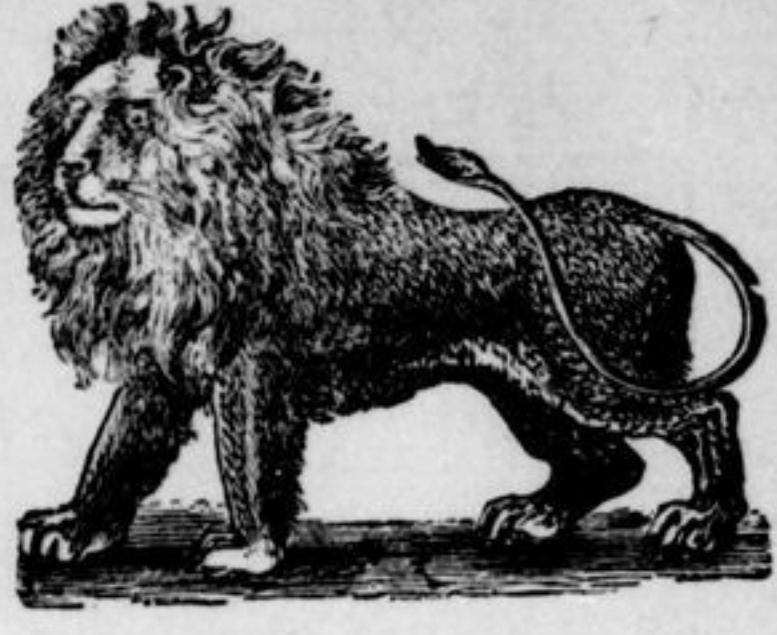

### HELP FOR THE HOUSEKEEPER

For indigestion, try the beaten white of an egg in a wineglassful of water directly after meals.

A good beefsteak, however well cooked, will not be at its best unless served directly as it is cooked.

Mice object to camphor, which if put in places frequented by them will drive them away completely.

Preserve parsley (for winter by drying it in a cool oven, and then keeping in air-tight tins or bottles.

When nailing the cover on a box slant the nails a trifle; they will hold such better than if put in straight.

A dainty way to eat peaches is to cut them in two and eat each half with a spoon as you do an orange.

To use up cold pork, cut it into neat slices, sprinkle it with pepper and salt, fry on both sides, and serve with apple sauce.

The resilvering of a mirror is not a satisfactory process in the hands of an amateur and it is not advisable to try it.

When without a colander or sieve a perforated pie plate makes a good substitute in straining gravy and draining greens.

To remove scorch, cover scorch with common laundry starch and dampen. Let it dry in the sun for one hour, then brush starch off.

For stings or bites of any kind of insect apply dampened salt bound tightly over the spot. It will relieve and usually cure very quickly.

Place eggs on table. With the finger and thumb try to spin them. A good egg will only twirl a little while; a bad one will spin like a top.

To put low shoes on without a shoe horn put a part of a handkerchief in the shoe before putting it on, then pull, and it will slip on easily.

Good rice puddings may be made without eggs, by using in addition to the rice and milk, a small piece of butter. Cook the pudding three hours.

To keep butter sweet and firm in the summer without ice, where the butter is not too soft, place a napkin around it and completely bury it in flour.

To keep poached eggs in shape set the water whirling with a spoon and drop the egg in the centre of the maelstrom. The motion rounds the eggs.

A satisfactory floor covering, particularly for children's rooms is a plain cork carpet, with a few washable rugs in tins to match the walls and draperies.

If the braid on the dress skirt has begun to fray it can be made to do duty some time longer by running the worn portion back and forth with a thread.

Stains on flannel may be removed by applying equal quantities of yolk of egg and glycerine and allowing it to soak for half an hour before the garment is washed.

Clean your bronze with this solution: One drachm of sweet oil, one ounce each of alcohol and water. Apply this quickly with a soft sponge, but do not rub.

For inflamed eyes use the white of an egg beaten with a froth, and add to it a tablespoonful of rosewater. Apply on a soft pad of rag and moisten it as often as it dries.

Before scrubbing floors cover grease spots by pouring a little ammonia over them. Let soak a few minutes, scrub as usual using soap or powder as you desire.

In making marmalades and butters of peaches, plums and like fruits leave a few seeds in while cooking and you will find that the fruit is less apt to stick to the kettle and burn.

To clean windows easily, rub your window panes with a piece of soft linen wetted with common vinegar. Then polish with a clean dry cloth, and your window will be beautifully clean.

Put the broiler pan of your gas range up in the oven and set your pie in it. The pie will bake just as well, and if the juice runs out, and it always does, it will not burn and smoke.

Nothing keeps out moths so well as paper. If every one, when they put away furs packed up all crevices and round the lid of the box with paper they would find them all all intact when unpacked.

Fruit is better for children than sweets. They always like it, and if perfectly fresh and ripe is very wholesome. Don't let children expect sugar with fruit, it is far better for them without it.

Clean your stained glass globes thus: Dip a wet flannel into powdered pumice stone and with it rub the stained parts. When quite clean wash the globes in clear water and dry with a soft cloth.

Cure for felon.—Take a tablespoon of butter just from the churn without salt. Stir enough calomel in the butter to make stiff paste. Spread on cloth and put on felon. This is a sure cure.

Citron which stands awhile is difficult to eat, as it gets extremely hard. If taken and placed in a colander and held over steam for a short while it will regain its original freshness and be ready for use.

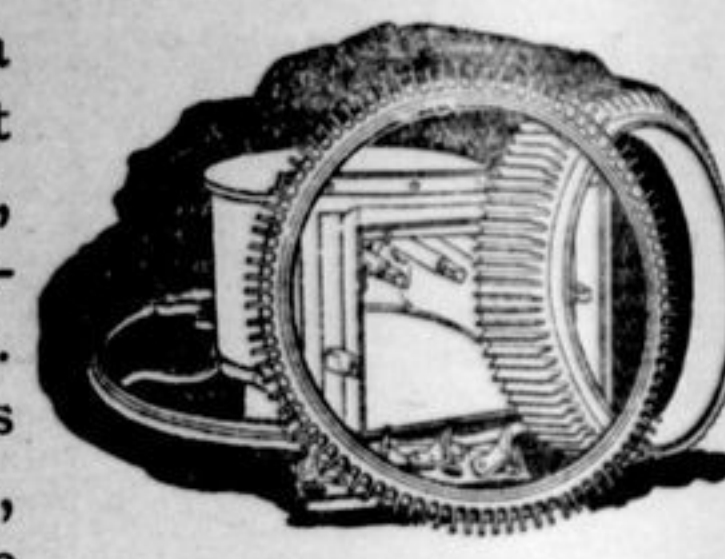

Cook fish well, for if at all underdone, it is not only unpalatable, but unwholesome.

To effectually seal a box of cereals between times of using close one of the inside flaps, then the two outer ones, and over these the second inside flap, pushing a common pin in to hold in place.

The best all-round fruit is the apple. Both children and adults who eat freely of good, ripe, mellow apples, either raw or baked, and with the skins removed are free from various forms of indigestion, liver trouble and constipation.

To utilize left-over corn, cut from the cob, then chop very fine. Put over the fire in a shallow pan, adding milk to moisten slightly. Let it just come to a boil, no more, or it will be hopelessly toughened; season with salt, pepper and butter, and serve at once.

Old tablecloths or dinner napkins should not be thrown away; they make nice dusters for china, pictures and other ornaments. Pieces which are not large enough to use for this purpose should be kept rolled up in paper for dressing cuts or other wounds.

Here is a test for watered milk which is simplicity itself. A well-polished knitting needle is dipped into a deep vessel of milk and immediately withdrawn in an upright position. If the sample is pure some of fluid will hang to the needle, but if water has been added to the milk, even in small proportion, the fluid will not adhere to the needle.
