"I would prefer the flake salt, as it dissolves more readily and is not so liable to make mottles," says a dairyman. Salt adds flavor to the butter and materially increases its keeping quality. Buttermakers differ as to the amount of salt which should be used in butter. Very high salting, howthe fine, delicate aroma of butter, option of the proprietor. while at the same time it tends to cover up slight defects in flavor. Salt very readily absorbs odors and must therefore be kept in a clean, dry place. where the air is pure. should be of the same temperature as the butter when used.
