In his report to the Government Mr. Robertson stated that the slaughtered carcasses could be carried to t'e home market in such excellent condition that every farmer would receive from \$17.00 to \$24.00 per 'ead more for his cattle, according to the we'ght of the an mal.

Abbatoirs or slaugi ter houses were to be erected at convenient points along the lines of railway for the convenience of producers.

Such was the enthusiasm at this brilliant prospect that the ' Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacif'e were making arrangements for the 'conestruction of refrigerator cars to be run upon all their l'nes in the Dominion to meet refrigerat r steamers at Montreal in the summer and Hali-Mr. R. 
