World's Wheat Crop.

An estimate of the world's wheat is given in "Donbush's List," a London publication, which cuts the prospects down 144,000,000 bushels from the estimate of a month ago. It also indicates a shortage of 33,200,000 bushels behind last year's crop. Following is a comparison of the world's wheat crop with that of last year. Figures indicate thousands of bushels, the last three figures in each case being omitted.
