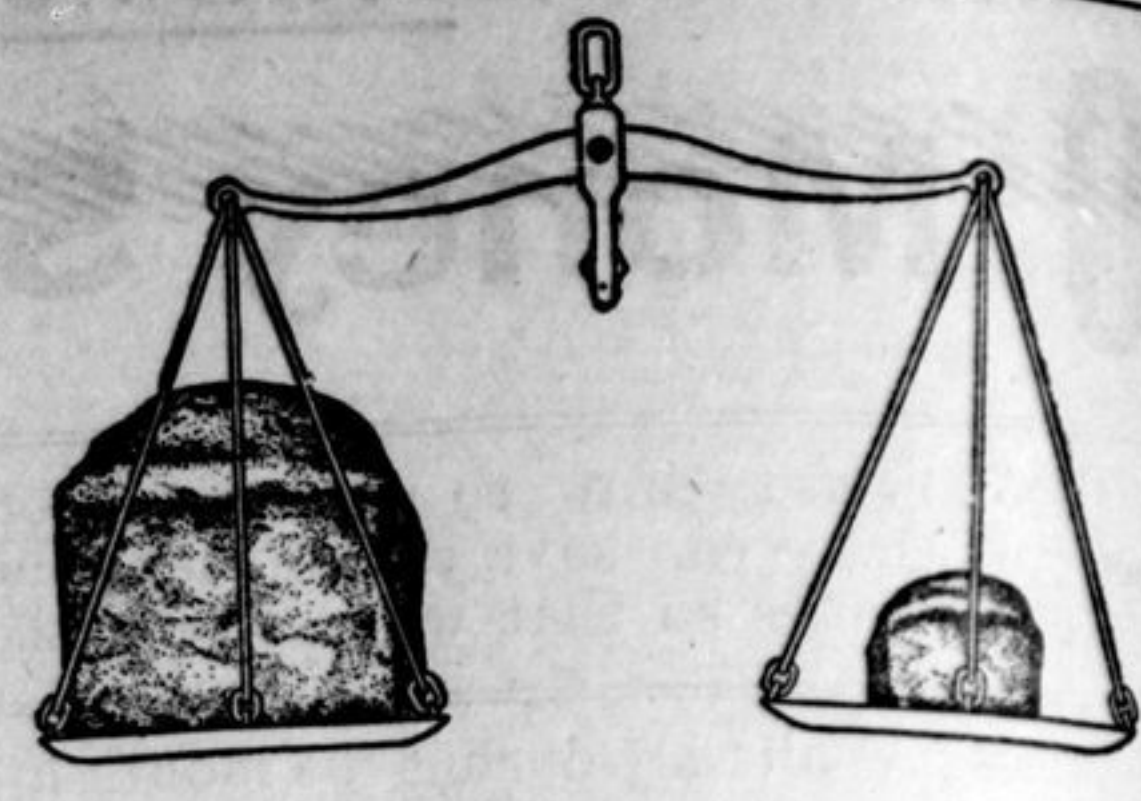
Then it was discovered that the real Irwin had gone to the Allan line people, had told them his plight, and had been given another ticket by them.

St. Thomas, Oct. 25.—Mr. Wm. Wallace, a native of Devon, England, died suddenly at the Amasa Wood hospital this morning from heart disease in his 34th year.

DRIVEN CLEAR THROUGH HIS BODY.

Guelph, Oct. 24.—George H. Young died in the General Hospital here yesterday afternoon as the result of injuries received yesterday while threshing at the farm of George Tuck in

The deceased came of a very well known family, his father being Mr. Robert Young, of Ospringe. He owned a farm in School Section No. 6, Guelph Township, and was well known indeed throughout the county.

TERRIBLY MANGLED BY FREIGHT TRAIN.

Guelph, Oct. 24.—Word has been received here of a horrible accident at Midway on Thursday afternoon which has shocked the whole community. Thomas Dunbar, an old man of the district, was the victim and he was killed as the result of being run down by a freight train.

The old man was very deaf and apparently did not hear the train approaching. He was struck full on the crossing. His horse was killed, the wagon smashed and the unfortunate driver was so mangled that only small portions of his remains could be discovered.

The crossing at which the accident occurred is a particularly dangerous one, and the approaches cannot be seen on one side on account of a high board fence shutting off the view. It is thought that the old man did not see or hear the train and was cut to pieces before he could have realized what happened. An inquest will be held.
