Mrs. Wm. Astor Dead.

New York, October 30.—Mrs. Wm. Astor, who for thirty years has been regarded as the social leader of New York, died to-night of heart disease at her home on Fifth avenue. For nearly four weeks Mrs. Astor, who was 82 years old, has been in a critical condition. Mrs. Grace Wilson, a daughter of Mrs. Astor, was with her mother when she died. There is no name in the American social register that is so well known as that of Mrs. Astor. It is Mrs. Astor who established the famous 400 list of names. Wm. Astor, who died in 1857, took little part in the social activities of his wife.

Mrs. Astor was Miss Carolne Selwyn, a daughter of Abraham Selwyn, a well known merchant. She was married to William Astor on September 32nd, 1858. John Jacob Astor was their only son. There were four daughters, two of them Mrs. Ogilvie Hag and Mrs. Orme Wilson are now living. The eldest daughter, Miss Emily Astor, who married J. J. Van Allen, died some years ago, as did Mrs. Helen Astor who married James Roosevelt-Rosvelt.

Liberal Returned to Power.

Montreal, November 1.—Le Nationaliste, the Bourassa organ, asserts that Sir Wilfrid Laurier carried the country on Monday last simply because he was a French-Canadian.

"There are in Ontario and lower provinces several hundred thousand of our compatriots, the greater number of whom voted for Sir James Whitney in Ontario and for Mr. Hazen in New Brunswick. Which, however, the federal elections came round these same electors voted as one man for Sir Wilfrid Laurier," says he.

The Nationaliste gives a table showing that out of twelve counties in Ontario, where the French-Canadian vote is very heavy, not a single one went Conservative. The names of the counties being Prescott, Ottawa, Russell, Nipissing, Essex North, Gengarry, Cornwall, and Stormont, Algonquin, Simcoe East, Kent, Essex South and Renfrew South.

In twelve counties in the Maritime Provinces, where the compatriots are in large numbers, an identical state of things are shown. These twelve counties are Gloucester, Kent, Westmoreland, Victoria, Northumberland and Westmorland in New Brunswick; Yarmouth, Digby, Richmond, Inverness and Antigonish in Nova Scotia, and Prince in Prince Edward Island. One county only out of twelve, Digby, N.S., elected a candidate to support Mr. Borden.

In a word, out of twenty-four counties in the English-speaking provinces where the French vote is very numerous, Sir Wilfrid carried twenty-three.

"We have, therefore, very little difficulty in explaining this result, when we see that fifteen hundred, a thousand, or five hundred ballots fall into the ballot box for the same candidate," says Le Nationaliste. "Take away the influence, however, and suppose that the vote was about equally divided in the French Canadian counties and in the rest of the country and the defeat of the government was assured. These are the brutal facts against which all the speeches in the world cannot prevail."
