**Awful Experience of two Sailors who Were Picked up on the Atlantic.**

London, Oct. 31.—Two derelict sailors landed at Liverpool after a terrible experience in the Atlantic. When picked up by the Warren liner Michigan they had been adrift in a small boat for eight days, during which period they had had no food and only half a gallon of water.

"We fainted on reaching the Michigan," said Burke, "and had to be carried to the banks, where we were fed like babies, so weak were we. And no wonder, after being exposed for eight days and nights in one small boat, with no food whatever, and only half a gallon of fresh water.

### Strain of Engineers.

The Canadian Journal on Medicine and Surgery says,—

As the exigencies of modern travel have introduced "flyer" in Canadian railroads, the duties of locomotive engineers have become more severe. As far as is known duty on slow trains does not cause the same severe strain. On very fast trains it is said that engine duty cannot be endured for more than a few years. Some of the engineers on the "flyers" are said to develop neurasthenia after working four years or even less. Nervous breakdown is said to appear in them suddenly, not only from exhaustion, but from the cumulative effect of the millions of little traumatism produced in their tissues by the jarring, shaking, jolting engine, driven for many hours at terrific speed. A locomotive engine effected with neurasthenia would be unfit for duty, especially as nervous breakdown in neurasthenic persons may appear quite suddenly. The result following from a slight error of judgment in such a case may be awful. As the wear and tear of the tissues of the locomotive engineers are increased by the speed of these "flyers," frequent examinations of the engineers as to the accuracy of their senses and the soundness of the nervous and muscular systems are necessary. Railroad surgeons are aware of these truths, and doubtless give them the consideration on which their importance demands.

### TUNNEL OPENS NOV. 12.

Sarnia, Ont., 30.—Railway officials from all over this continent are expected to visit Sarnia on November 12, on which date the Grand Trunk Railway Company will formally take over the St. Clair tunnel from the company which have just completed the installation of electricity as a means of power for hauling trains through the tunnel. ### HOUSEHOLD HELPS.

Eating greens and salads thins your blood and makes you less red-faced.

Water kept in bottles on the ice, instead of breaking the ice into the water, reduces ice bills.

Mix equal portions of glycerine and lemon juice to moisten the lips of a fevered, parched patient.

For a rusty stove, sprinkle lemon juice liberally over the rust before blacking and polishing the stove.

Growing parsley, sage and other herbs in a kitchen window garden gives better seasoning at less money.

To bake pancakes without greasing the griddle, add one teaspoonful of butter or half cup of cream to the batter.

To remove the burned edges of layer or loaf cake, use fine sandpaper as soon as the cake is "set," but before it gets cold.

The flavor of a meat stew can be entirely changed, and pleasantly so, by the addition of a little grape or tomato catsup.

If your soup is found too salty add a few slices of raw potatoes and cook a little longer. The potato will absorb the surplus salt.

Paraffin used on the tops of preserve glasses can be saved until the next season by washing in cold water and putting in a tin box with a tight lid.

Do not discard old military hair brushes. They are a great convenience in dusting the stove. The pans and gratings are easily swept clean with a brush of this kind.

To extract juice of lemon or orange much more juice will be obtained if the fruit is first covered with cold water and allowed to come to a boil before the fruit is cut.

To make soft gingerbread, take one cup of molasses, ½ cup drippings, ½ cup sugar, 2½ cups flour. Lastly add 1 cup boiling water. Beat together quickly and bake in rather quick oven.

Every cereal, with the exception of rice, that needs any soaking needs a great deal of it. Soaking over night is indispensable to the excellence of most of them. Few hours' boiling makes it better; twenty-four hours' makes it best.

A handy disinfectant for household use is made of chlorate of lime moistened with vinegar and water in equal parts. It may be kept in the cellar all the time, and in case of sickness a few drops scattered about will purify the air in the room.

For the luncheon at home put large square salted crackers into the oven to heat. When warm put on each cracker a large tablespoon or two of baked beans and catsup, heated with butter and highly seasoned. This is a Mexican dish and a fine relish.

An old fashioned recipe for cleaning the inside of a rusty kettle consisted in filling it to the brim with hay. As much water as it will hold should then be poured over the top, the kettle placed on the fire and boiled for several hours, more water being added when required.

A simple way of keeping the baby's bottle of milk warm for the midnight meal is this: Make a cover for a hot water bag, and put in it a pocket which will conveniently hold the bottle of milk. Fill the hot-water bag and the bottle at the same time, and cover them with a blanket until baby wants his meal.

If you have an old bicycle pump about the house, you can put it to good service when next you clean your sewing machine. Tiny pieces of lint, threads and the like can be blown out of the crevices and the machine cleaned in much less time. An atomizer can often be used for the same purpose.

To prevent the sad iron from sticking to starched garments, simply make the starch with strong soap suds, using pure white soap, instead of clear water. The irons will not stick at all.

Japanned trays should never be touched with hot water, for it will cause the varnish to crack and peel off. To clean these trays, rub a little

olive oil on and then polish it with a flannel.

An old tennis racket threaded with stout cord makes the best kind of flower rack for trailing plants that need a frame. Cut off half the handle, sharpen the end and drive it in the flower crock.

If, when using lemon for flavoring, you need only half a one, put the other half on a plate and cover with a glass tumbler. This excludes the air and prevents it from drying or getting mouldy.

If housewives who dislike to find worms when cutting apples would first put the fruit in cold water, they would find that the worms would leave the apples and come to the surface of the water.

Stains on carpets can often be removed by making a thick paste of fuller's earth to which a little ammonia has been added. Put on the paste thickly, let it stand twenty-four hours and brush it off.

When broiling steaks in the oven put water in the pan beneath the broiler. It catches all grease which, when cold, can be skimmed off. This keeps the oven clean and saves the labor in cleaning the pan.

The soot that settles at the bottom of the teakettle, caused by being of the fire, will keep the top of the kitchen stove blacked. Dampen cloth, rub on the bottom of kettle then over the stove, and it will keep the stove bright.

Every home should be supplied with a handy box which contains one tube of glue, box of twine, box of assorted fasteners and suspension rings, rubber bands, gummed labels, bottle and jar labels, small string tags, package of large and small tags, spool of adhesive tape and a box of key tags. These may be purchased very cheaply.

French peas and rice—Line a small baking dish with rice, having a good layer in the bottom. In this place either fresh peas slightly cooked in salt water or the contents of a can of French peas. Place in this a cupful of rich cream, a teaspoonful of butter, and season with salt and pepper. Bake for 15 minutes and serve as the vegetable accompaniment of your dinner.
