In the Hands of Children.

The Bruce Herald in reporting the evening meeting of the East Bruce Teachers' Association, has the follow- ing to say:—"The strong piece of the entertain- ment was a lecture on "The great- est want of our age," by N. W. Camp- bell, B.A., school inspector, Durham. Mr. Campbell held the greatest need of the age to be honesty, high sense of duty, firm resistance to wrong doing, opposition to graft, and fair dealing between men in all the relations of life, practically falling back on the Ten Commandments as our moral guide. These views were well presented by Mr. Campbell and warmly applauded by his hearers. The Rev. Mr. Wright and Mr. Robb moved a vote of thanks at the close of the address. On motion of Mr. Longman, principal of Chesley High School, and Mr. Campbell, principal of Walkerton Public School, the cer- e- mony of entertainers were also warmly thanked by the audience. The audi- ence was composed almost entirely of teachers, mostly young girls with a small sprinkling of boys. There were only a few teachers of experience among them. Young girls sorely do- ing play with dolls listened with solemnity to Mr. Campbell's admoni- tions on their high moral responsi- bility in forming the characters of their pupils. It was admirable. They are at once expected to do the work of parents, clergy and school teach- er, for the reward of their own con- science and the salary of a domestic servant. The chairman advised them to form county unions and exert themselves in a practical way to con- vince trustees that better salaries should be paid. He also advocated a superannuation system for teachers. The meeting was closed with the national anthem."
