The moving picture entertainment advertised to be held in the town hall here on Saturday night last failed to materialize, owing to the inability of the management to make connections with the electric light company and secure electrical energy with which to run their machine. From one source we learn that it was a case of point blank refusal on the part of Mr. McIntyre to allow them to connect their wires, who gave as his excuse the scarcity of the water at the present time, and also that on Saturday nights especially the merchants demand all the light the company can furnish. Mayor Calder was appealed to and was willing to interview the Fire and Light Committee and allow the street lamps to be turned off while the show was on. In an interview with Mr. McIntyre, however, the Chronicle was told that he would not, at present, furnish power to any moving picture machine, to the detriment of the resident consumers, and was not aware until nearly seven o'clock that any was wanted. Had they asked him previous to advertising the performance, he would have given them the same information. These are the facts as we have them, and though we would like to see encouragement given to shows to hold engagements here, we will not, in this instance, take sides with either party. The same show will be held here next Saturday evening, and arrangements have been made to run the machine with gas, so there will be no disappointment this time.
