On July 4th a case of diphtheria
was reported to the Board; this was
immediately attended to by the
Sanitary Inspector, Mr. McCulloch;
the patient recovered and there was
no spread of the disease. Outside of
the cases mentioned the public health
of the Township has been good for
the past year and sanitary condi-
tion well looked after by the
inspectors in the several divisions. I
append a statement of the personal
