By-Law Number 55

THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF DURHAM.

A BY-LAW to authorize the Town of Durham to issue debentures to the amount of \$11,000 for the purpose of building a bridge across the Sauguenet River at the mouth of the said Town of Durham.

AND WHEREAS the time for the payment of the said debentures will expire on the tenth day of June, 1909, and it is deemed advisable to extend the time for payment of the said debentures for a further period of twenty years...

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
